

President Backs Wheeler In Montana Primary Vote

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—The vote-pulling power of a friendly letter from President Truman encounters a test tomorrow in Montana's democratic primary, which finds James Roosevelt, son of the late president, and at least two labor organizations backing Senator Burton K. Wheeler's re-nomination bid.

Lined up on one side are Wheeler and Mr. Truman, who protested against the "smear campaign" he said was being made against his old senate colleague.

On the other are Lief Erickson, Wheeler's opponent, James Roosevelt, who urged nomination of Erickson in a statewide radio address because he said Wheeler went to "a very dangerous extreme in opposing policies designed for the protection of our nation in critical times," the CIO Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, Senator James E. Murray (D-Mont) and some members of the National Farmers union.

The senate campaign investigating committee has pushed into this crisis-cross of alignment to dig into (1) contentions by Wheeler that he has been subjected to "unfair propaganda" and (2) a somewhat similar counter assertion by Erickson.

'Smear' Claimed
Acting Chairman Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo) said he probably will call the group together tomorrow to hear New York and Montana witnesses testify about Wheeler's claim that a recently published book attempted to "smear" him.

Mishaps Claim 5 In Weekend

Three traffic fatalities and two drownings were reported in northwest Oregon over the weekend.

Deputy Sheriff Ronald Calbeck reported two pedestrians, Joseph W. Hufft, 49, of Almonogordo, N. M., and B. F. Morrison, 38, Portland, were struck and killed by a truck on St. Helens road and the driver, Joseph L. Nakvasil, 24, Scappoose, was arrested later on a charge of negligent homicide. The sheriff's office said the driver failed to stop and was arrested at Scappoose.

Mrs. Margaret Tripp, 19, Portland, was fatally injured when an auto in which she and her husband were passengers collided with a second car in Portland.

The drowning victims were Lowell Grant Fox, 19, recently discharged from the navy, who tumbled into the Nehalem river while fishing Saturday, and Tryggve Paulson, 58, Multnomah county home inmate whose body was recovered Sunday from the Sandy river near Troutdale.

Tillamook County Coroner Arthur Lundberg reported Fox's older brother, E. C. Fox, attempted a rescue but also slipped on the rocks. When he recovered his footing the younger brother had disappeared in the water. The body was recovered.

British Decorations Given 6 Oregonians

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP) Award of the King's Medal for "service in the cause of freedom" to six Oregonians by the British government was reported today by Lord Inverchapel, the British ambassador.

The award was announced along with decorations given 1277 Americans for various wartime services earning the 69 various ranks in the Order of the British Empire.

Costigan Says Fight Still On

SEATTLE, July 15 (AP)—Howard G. Costigan has lost two democratic primary races in a row to Rep. Hugh De Lacy, but he has "just begun to fight."

Costigan announced his determination to keep battling in a statement issued Saturday night and reported he was forming an "anti-communist organization of independents, liberals and progressives" at the request of representatives of labor, business and industry and the two major parties.

It will not, he said, be a third party movement.

Costigan, who resigned as head of Governor Mon C. Wallgren's state advisory commission to make the race for congress in the first district, declared he would work unceasingly "not only to defeat De Lacy, but all communist-backed candidates."

The contest this year, which Costigan led until a heavy De Lacy vote poured in with the tabulations from Kitsap county, was spiced by the side-taking of two Roosevelts. Anna Roosevelt Boettiger backed Costigan; brother James Roosevelt supported De Lacy.
