

Legion Busy On Last Day Of Meeting

PORTLAND, July 17 (AP)—The American Legion state convention worked through a long list of resolutions today and behind schedule in the final day of its session.

It appeared that election of officers and selection of next year's convention site would not be decided until late afternoon. The business meetings originally had been scheduled for noon adjournment.

Barring last-minute upsets, however, Fred A. Lothrop, Portland, was expected to move up from vice-commander to the commander's position and Mrs. Leon M. Brown, Salem, to the auxiliary presidency.

The convention retained in its own hands the power to create or alter districts and shift posts from one district to another. It defeated a move to give the or alter districts and shift posts authority to the executive committee.

Resolutions Passed

Among resolutions passed were three dealing with the press and radio; protest against identifying persons charged with offenses as veterans or as members of the armed forces, a recommendation that posts seek more publicity for their activities, and a commendation to radio stations for broadcasting Legion programs.

The convention late yesterday approved division of the Oregon department into three areas and heard Maj. Gen. Paul W. Kendall, commanding general of Fort Lewis, praise the Legion's stand for strong national defense.

The Legion auxiliary yesterday elected as district presidents: Mrs. Mitchell C. Thorne, Seaside; Mrs. Stanley Krueger, Salem; Mrs. Violet Larsen, of Springfield; Miss Dora Sexton, The Dalles; Mrs. Maye Zimmerman, Athena; Mrs. C. P. Holbrook, Baker; Mrs. Cecilia Oliverio, Portland; Mrs. William Kehrl, Portland.

The Follett trophy for the outstanding post in the state went to Hollywood post, Portland. Second was Bonneyville and third, Corbett.

Growers Seek Army Housing

TULELAKE, July 17—Chester Main, president of Tulelake Growers, said today that operators in this area expect to obtain from the U. S. bureau of reclamation the army buildings at Camp Tulelake for transient housing during the fall harvest.

Thus far, Main said, no definite word as to use of the buildings has been received from Washington but pressure is being brought to bear on California senators and representatives and the bureau of reclamation to get an early answer. At the present time, Main advised, the outlook is favorable.

A few of the buildings are now being used for housing Mexican labor, weeding potato and onion fields. Buildings considered for use this fall for transient labor, includes the barracks, officers' quarters, mess halls, the theatre and officers' club. These buildings will be left at their present location and could accommodate between 900 and 1000 persons.

Main said if the setup is approved, it will be the best the growers have had from the housing standpoint. It is planned to install a camp manager who will work under Clifford Wood, active manager of Tulelake Growers.

Canning and quick freeze outfits are also being contacted by the growers in an effort to bring plants into the Tulelake area to handle vegetable crops now under cultivation. This will take care of such crops as beets, peas and spinach. Inasmuch as Tulelake is too far from market centers for competition in market sales, the freezing and canning plants could handle considerable of the output. Six companies have been contacted and three have replied, seeking additional information, Main said.
