

Brooklyn Bulge Cut To Fraction

Ervin Dusak, virtually unknown rookie outfielder of the St. Louis Cardinals is the fair-haired boy to thousands in St. Louis today.

"Four Sack Dusak," "The Bohemian Blaster," last night hammered what may become one of the most important blows of the National league pennant race.

The 26-year-old native of Chicago clouted a three-run pinch-hit ninth inning home run in Sportsman's park to give the Cardinals a 5-4 victory over the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers and move the Redbirds to within a half game of the Brooks.

Dusak batted for Pitcher Howie Pollet after Southpaw Joe Hatten had nicked Marty Marion with a pitched ball and Clyde Klutznick singled. After fouling off a pitch and taking a called second strike, Dusak crushed Hatten's next offering into the left field stands before 26,581 fans.

The righthanded swinging Dusak broke into organized ball with Monett of the Arkansas-Missouri league in 1938 and belted 18 homers. He advanced rapidly through the Card system, gaining a reputation as a home-run hitter and in 1941 and 1942 he participated in a few games with Cards. Dusak entered the army in January, 1943, and was discharged in January of this year.

Bruins Blanked
Chicago's third place Cubs missed an opportunity to gain on the Dodgers as Bill Voiselle of the New York Giants planked the Cubs, 1-0 on six hits. Bill Rigney singled in the winning run in the ninth frame to keep the Bruins four and one-half games off the pace.

Boston's front-running American league Red Sox dropped their second home game of the season to a western club as Bobby Feller of the Cleveland Indians scattered nine Red Sox hits to post his 16th win of the year, 6-3.

The Boston Braves took over undisputed possession of fourth place in the eastern circuit by trouncing the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-0 behind big Mort Cooper while the Cincinnati Reds were shutout, 2-0 by Schoolboy Rowe of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Kramer Wins Again
The St. Louis Browns retained their fifth place deadlock with Cleveland by trimming the Washington Senators, 7-1 behind Jack Kramer. Al Zarilla and Vern Stephens led the Browns' attack on three Washington hurlers with four hits apiece.

In the only other contest of the day, Portside Edgar Smith of the Chicago White Sox limited the Philadelphia Athletics to five safeties in elbowing the Pale Hose to a 6-2 victory.

At Oakland the Acorns owed their 4-1 victory over the Los Angeles Angels to mighty Les Scarcella, who broke up a tight pitching duel by driving in two runs with a single to right with the bases loaded and the score 1-1 in the sixth frame.

This allowed the Acorns to maintain their place one-half game behind the Seals, even though outthrew 7-5. Frank Serna went the entire distance and was credited with the win.

At Sacramento Al Vitalich pitched the San Diego Padres to a 4-0 win over the Solons to break a long San Diego losing streak. The Padres went to work in the first inning to clinch the game then and there.

Portland shut out Seattle 5-0 in a game at Portland featuring the cellar rivals. Roy Helsler was the winning hurler.

Fair Rent Committee Formed In Portland
PORTLAND, July 17 (P)—A fair rent committee was formed here yesterday by owner representatives, designed to discourage drastic rent increases in the Portland area.

The committee, representing the Portland Home Builders' association, the Oregon Motor Court association, Portland Realty Board, Hotel Association of Portland and Oregon Apartment House association, drew up the following four-point program:

To lend advice and assistance to tenants; to discourage drastic and unwarranted rent increases; to investigate rent increase complaints, and to give assistance in housing veterans.

Borowy Seeks Blister Cure

CHICAGO, July 17 (P)—Cub Pitcher Hank Borowy, who has finished only one of 14 starts this season, believes he has hit on a cure for his blisters which have turned him from a star into an occasional workman.

"Every night for more than a week," he says, "I have been rubbing his finger (the second finger of his right hand) on a baseball right along the seams for half an hour at a time. Already it has toughened up, and as soon as the soreness goes from the forefinger I'll give it the same treatment."

Sons Journey Into Valley

A trip over the Greensprings with a night baseball game on the other end is on the agenda for the Klamath Sons tonight. The locals go to Medford to play a second game with the Craters under the lights at Medford's fairgrounds.

The game is scheduled to start at 8:30. Early in the season the Sons stumbled before the Craters 8 to 3, and this is the first opportunity that the Klamath boys have had to meet the Craters again.

Medford is in the Southern Oregon league, the same loop as the Roseburg Umpqua Chiefs, with whom Klamath split a doubleheader over the Fourth of July period.

Ursel Snapp Kayoes Peters In Second

A straight, maul-like right to the button spelled good night for Johnny Peters midway of the second round of the armory main event last night, and Merrill's Ursel Snapp marked up a kayo over the chunky Eureka, Calif., lightweight.

Peters was caught fair on the chin by the blow and dropped face downward on the canvas. As Referee Wally Moss tolled off the count, Peters rolled over on his side and was struggling to get his legs under him.

It was the second time Peters had been down that round. The first came passed with a good deal of slugging and an edge for Snapp. Early in the second Snapp let one of Peters' lefts slide over his shoulder and Johnny's momentum, aided by punches, took him to the floor, where he stayed for nine seconds.

The semi-final between Johnny Jones and Teddy Roosevelt went to a unanimous five-round decision for Jones, although Teddy had his best round in the fifth, getting Jones in a bad way on the ropes and knocking him to the floor momentarily.

The first two rounds had been very close with no damage and Jones had gotten in during the third and fourth for points.

Roosevelt was subbing for Gene Darko, slated to fight Jones, who showed up with a broken finger.

The best action of the evening came in the four-round brawl between Pepsi Marino and Pete Gordon, middleweights. Marino fought from a crouch and covered well, and it was a mill all the way.

By the third round Gordon had slowed down and Marino plugged him a lift to the face and Pete went down. The bell rang at seven and Gordon was dragged over to his corner. Then in the last heat Gordon slipped to his knee and stayed down for nine, was pushed into the ropes and knocked down again for nine. A moment later Marino crossed him with a right and left, and Referee Moss gave the fight to Marino without counting.

Ike Waltons Meet Tonight
The tentative hunting regulations for this fall which have been announced by the state game commission will probably get a thorough going over tonight by members of the Isaak Walton league when the sportsmen and conservationists meet in the Willard hotel.

The meeting, with Kep McLeod presiding, is scheduled to begin at 8 p. m.

Frank McCormack, who was in attendance at the game commission's hearing in Portland last week when the tentative deer and elk laws were formulated, is expected to report to the Ikes on why various phases of the regulations were written in.

The proposed laws, which must come through another public hearing late this month before adoption, set up a 23-day deer season this fall, in place of the 30-day open period in 1945, and also provide for controlled antlerless deer shoots in Lake and other counties, with a limited number of permits being issued for does.
