

Talmadge Back To Defend State's 'White Supremacy'

ATLANTA, July 18 (AP)—The pendulum has swung again in Georgia it seems, sending Eugene Talmadge, the defender of white supremacy, to the governor's mansion for the fourth time.

The returns are not all in from yesterday's democratic primary—the counting may last for hours yet—and no one is conceding anything, but Talmadge's apparent lead is increasing.

The unit votes are what count in Georgia and Talmadge has enough indicated unit votes to win, with some to spare. Yet 36-year-old James V. Carmichael is leading in the popular vote.

Georgia's 159 counties, many of them tiny, have 454 unit votes. A candidate is elected with a majority, 206. The latest count puts Talmadge ahead in 97 counties with 220 unit votes.

Carmichael, backed by Gov. Ellis Arnall, the man who defeated Talmadge four years ago on a reform platform, led in 100 counties with a unit vote of 234.

The popular vote was: Carmichael 206,052; Talmadge, 178,814; Ex-Gov. E. D. Rivers, 36,973 and Hoke O'Kelley, 6824.

Rivers led in eight counties with 18 unit votes. O'Kelley had no unit votes.

The returns were from 156

counties. Many of the counties apparently still had blocks of votes unreported.

The primary—equivalent to the election in Georgia—was the first time that negroes had voted in great numbers in the deep south. About 135,000 of them registered, and most voted.

Yet Talmadge's election may mean the restoration of the traditional "white" democratic primary in Georgia which the U. S. supreme court said must go.

Talmadge promised to bring back the white primary by putting it beyond state control, as South Carolina did two years ago.

Opponents of such a change contend, however, that it would endanger the state's unique county unit system which permits small rural counties to dominate state affairs.

White persons outnumber negroes in Georgia nearly two to one, although in some counties it is the other way around. Total registration during the vitriolic campaign exceeded a million—double the normal figure.

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Fire Losses Pass \$11,000

Loss by fire in Klamath Falls during the first six months of 1946 amounted to a little over \$11,000 with the Klamath Falls fire department answering 96 calls. Careless smokers and defective wiring were attributed as the cause of one-fourth of the fires.

Fire equipment was used for 22 hours and 4 minutes during the six months and the department hoisted 136 feet of ladder.

Inspections for fire hazards totaled 652, and during this time 92 hazards were eliminated. The fire department also granted 926 fire permits.

Funeral Rites Held For Lebanon Editor

LEBANON, July 18 (P)—Funeral services were held here yesterday for George Alexander, 82, retired newspaperman, who died Sunday.

He edited the Lebanon Express for 50 years after working earlier for his father who owned the Eugene Guard, and on the Oregonian.

His widow survives.
