

# 14-Year-Old Accused Of Second Kill

OROVILLE, Calif., July 19 (AP) — A second death was charged today to Albert Jones, 14-year-old schoolboy, who was quoted by one of his alleged victims of assault as saying, "I just feel like killing sometimes."

District Attorney J. M. McPherson filed a murder charge against the youth yesterday in the death of Patricia Ann Crandall, 15, and said he would make it a double charge as a result of the death from bullet wounds of Mrs. Harold J. Nielsen.

Mrs. Nielsen, a housewife, died in the Emloe hospital last night after Jones previously had been charged with attempting to murder her. McPherson quoted the youth as admitting he shot her in the back last Tuesday as she

turned to get him some cookies and a glass of water.

The district attorney also said Jones had confessed strangling the Crandall girl in her home, setting fire to the house and walking away after the flames had begun to burn her hair. Miss Crandall was believed at first to have died accidentally.

**Other Charges Filed**

Jones was accused in other charges filed yesterday of attempted murder of Mrs. Nielsen's husband and assault with intent to murder their daughter and a neighbor child.

McPherson said the frail-looking accused youth had confessed:

"Tying up Mrs. Nielsen's 21-year-old daughter, Betty, and a neighbor, Barbara Searle, 6, and gagging them by stuffing apricots into their mouths and knotting handkerchiefs over their lips.

Firing a pistol shot which ripped through the shirt sleeve of H. J. Nielsen when he rushed home to the rescue of his wife, daughter and the neighbor child.

Betty Nielsen said Jones told her before the rescue that he just sometimes felt like killing got "the urge to do something like this every now and then."

She said he let her telephone her father with the comment, "I want to kill him, too."

Alfred E. Smith attended school for only seven years, but had honorary degrees from six universities.

## Naval Reserve Plans Armory

PORTLAND, July 19 (AP)—A \$1,000,000 armory, with facilities for training radar workers, sound men, machinists, gunners and other experts, was in prospect for Portland today.

Three hundred navy veterans were told at the opening meeting of the Portland battalion of the 13th naval district has recommended construction of the armory here. Final approval must come from Washington, D. C.

The naval battalion here will include 1000 men and 65 officers, four surface divisions and one submarine division. The armory would be used for them, for a marine reserve training unit, and a Seabee reserve unit.
