Lake Draws Big Crowd On Weekend

Seeking relief from torrid temperatures in nearby cities, approximately 8000 persons visited the Lake o' the Woods recreation area over the weekend, and resort owners reported Sunday was the biggest business day in the resort's history.

An unofficial road check conducted from noon Saturday until 4 p. m. Sunday counted 800 cars entering the area from the Klamath side, and it was estimated about the same number came in from Medford and Ashland. Nearly 1500 persons crowded Rainbow Bay and Aspen forest camps, practically all summer homes were occupied, and all resort cabins were full.

Hundreds of complaints were heard regarding the poor condition of roads leading to the lake, especially the road from Klamath Falls. Three bathhouse employees worked nearly all day Sunday repairing 20 tires for unlucky visitors. Some drivers remained overnight, hoping to avoid dust from other cars by returning early in the morning.

Maximum temperature at the lake Sunday was 84—cool, compared with Klamath Falls' 102. Among guests registered at the resort were Mr. and Mrs. Martin Ramsby, Dr. and Mrs. J. C.
