

Heat Chalks Heavy Toll In Mishaps

 Twenty persons were known dead and two others missing as a result of accidents, outings and heat as Washington residents sought to escape the Pacific northwest's three hottest days of the year.
 Five others were killed in Oregon during the same period, three in traffic mishaps and two by drowning.
 Heaviest toll in Washington was claimed by water accidents where nine persons lost their lives including two accidents to workmen and a third, in Seattle, due to a swimmer's dive onto a rock. One of the missing, Irwin D. Stewart, University of Washington faculty member and graduate student, also was believed to be a drowning victim in Lake Washington.
 The second unreported person, Ernest C. Hastreiter, Seattle college student, is missing on Granite mountain in the Cascades where he was last seen Sunday afternoon, barefooted and clad only in shorts, after apparently becoming irrational from the heat.
 Seven persons were killed in traffic mishaps and two as a result of air crashes.
 One death occurred in a mountain outing and another was attributed to heat prostration.

Housing Labor Lack Impends

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23 (AP) — Materials shortages for home building are easing rapidly, but the industry soon will face a more critical skilled labor shortage, a national housing agency specialist told the Portland mayor's committee on veterans' housing.
 Frank Bacon, materials and labor agent from the Seattle NHA office, said new labor must be drawn from the apprentice field and urged a campaign to encourage veterans to apply for apprenticeships.
 Bacon warned the construction industry has not drawn sufficient apprentice applicants and soon will feel the crippling effects of the shortage.

OPA Price Executive Moved From Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23 (AP) — Andrew H. Trice, district OPA price executive who has been in the center of many OPA drives here to keep the lid on prices, has been transferred to San Francisco.
 District OPA Director McDaniel Brown said Trice will be a price economist in the regional office effective August 1.

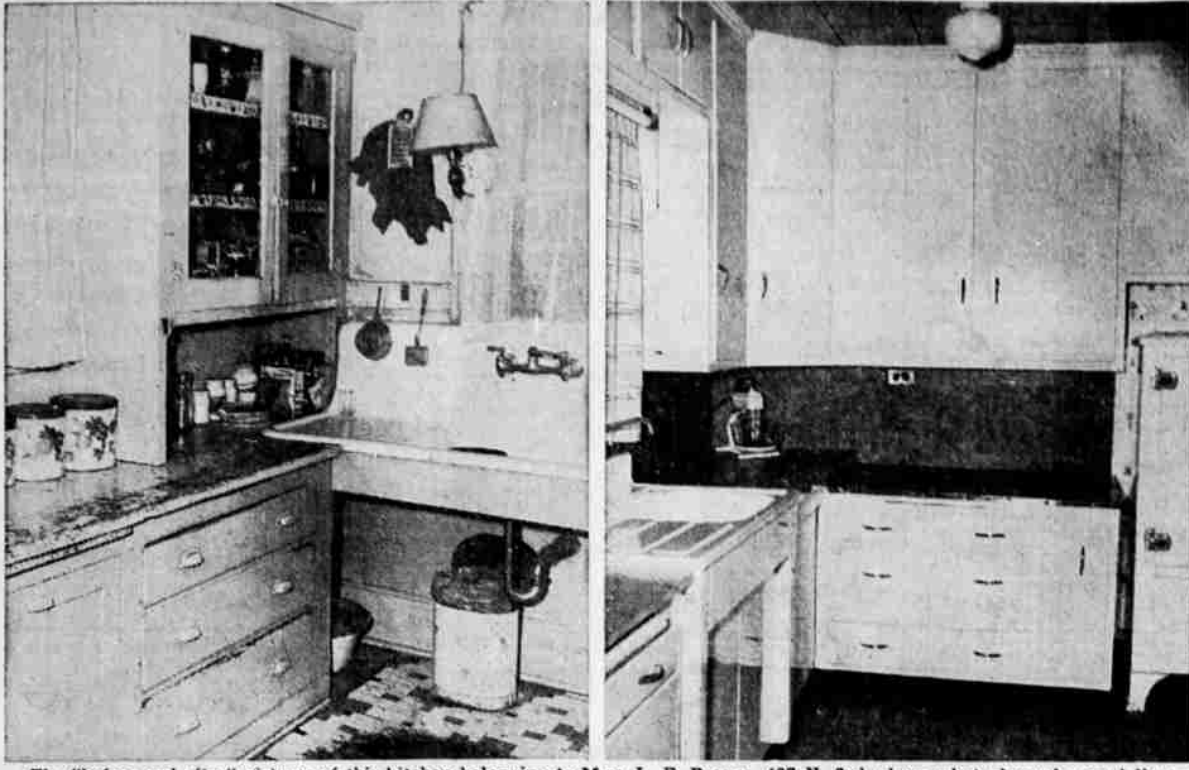

Lumbermen To Seek Increase

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23 (AP) — The Oregon district council of AFL sawmill and lumber workers will ask for new wage increases to offset higher living costs, Doyle Pearson, executive secretary of the union, said today.
 Pearson reported the Willamette valley district in Eugene has asked the union executive committee to negotiate for higher pay and that other districts are expected to take similar action.
 The union official said any wage demands will be determined at the August 10 or 17 meeting of the executive committee and that a reclassification of 35 lumber industry ratings would also be sought to decrease the number of pay brackets.
