**TRANSPORTATION NEWS**

"Acting now to insure future transportation for the west's increasing production of perishable crops, Southern Pacific and Union Pacific recently authorized their jointly-owned Pacific Fruit Express company to purchase 3000 more refrigerator cars of the most modern design," a bulletin from the Southern Pacific stated recently. This will make 5000 reefer cars ordered by Pacific Fruit Express since the first of this year, including a previous order of 2000 all cars are expected before the end of 1947.

The new refrigerator cars will weigh about 4000 pounds less than conventional cars, and will have new-type convertible bulkheads, half-stage icing devices, fans for circulating air in the cars, air ducts in car walls, heringbone floor racks, one-piece hatch covers, wrought-steel wheels and easy riding trucks.

**Post Office Probes Pilfering Of Checks**

**PORTLAND, July 24 (AP)**—Postal authorities today investigated theft of an envelope with \$18,493 in non-negotiable checks from the post office mailbox of the Clackamas county bank in Sandy.

**First Of 1946 Wheat En Route To Mills**

**MADRAS, July 24 (AP)**—This central Oregon area's first wheat of the 1946 crop was rolling to a Redmond feed mill today with Glen Deshazer's delivery followed closely by that of Ben Evick.

The yield was averaging around 20 bushels an acre. Feed mill buyers are bidding \$1.85 a bushel, substantially above the commercial market, and most of the early local wheat harvest apparently will be used to relieve the dairy and poultry feed shortage.

**Caffrey Elected Chairman Of SEC**

**PHILADELPHIA, July 24 (AP)**—The securities and exchange commission today elected James J. Caffrey chairman to replace Ganson Purcell, who resigned last month.

Caffrey was first appointed to the commission in 1945. Previously he served for nine years as SEC administrator in the Boston and New York regional offices. Before coming to the commission he was trial counsel to the national recovery administration.
