PORTLAND, July 24 (AP)—Inspection and classification of restaurants here under the state sanitary code has resulted in "A" classifications for only 13 of 73 eating establishments inspected.

Grade "B" placards were given 24 and "C" ratings to 36. Dr. Thomas L. Meador reported. The city health officer explained that "C" rated cafes must qualify for "B" rating within 30 days or close their doors.

There are 1800 establishments to be inspected in the city.

Latest Klamath War Bride Is Lass From Emerald Isle

The latest of the service wives to arrive in Klamath Falls is Mrs. Howard McCamman of Dublin, Ireland. In addition to being a newcomer, she is also a new bride. She married Howard McCamman of Portland, a former army man, in Vancouver, Wash. July 5 soon after her arrival on the west coast.

It was during the time that she was in service as a petty officer in the Wrens that she met McCamman, then stationed in the British Isles with the army air corps. That was in July, 1945.

For Mrs. McCamman this is her first trip to the United States. Since she was not a serviceman's wife at the time of her departure from her native country, she had to leave by way of Sweden. After spending eight days there she sailed to New York aboard the Gripsholm and is proud that she didn't get seasick. "I couldn't let the navy down," she says.

She arrived in New York July 1 and flew from there to Portland. She is still amazed that "people here look so well and happy, and they're so friendly."

According to Mrs. McCamman, food is quite plentiful in Ireland, though not so abundant as in this country, but in England, people still line up for it.

The big problem just now for the McCamman is finding a place to live, but Mrs. McCamman takes it in her stride. Despite being in a strange country she says she likes Klamath Falls, although she isn't used to the weather, and doesn't feel a bit like a stranger.

McCamman is employed by Safeway stores here.

Alaskan Wreck Takes Big Toll

KODIAK, Alaska, July 24 (AP)—Treacherous waters of Shelikof strait left a lone known survivor of a sunken cannery tender today to tell how the 10 others aboard the 85-foot craft apparently perished in the storm-lashed waves.

The navy's Alaska sea frontier commander's headquarters reported the survivor, severely injured, was to be flown to a hospital here after another vessel rescued him from a floating gasoline container. He was Harold Aga of Larsen's bay.

Hope was abandoned for the three crew members and seven passengers, including two women, after ships and a navy plane failed to find a trace of any other survivors in an all-day search yesterday. The navy reported the tender Cougar, owned by the salmon packing firm
