Well, if being looked at is wearing out Yellowstone's natural wonders, they took quite a beating today. We were amazed at the numbers of people we saw in the park, speeding from one point of interest to another, swarming into the eating places, doing all the things one is supposed to do at Yellowstone.

Apparently, the urge to see the country has taken hold of Americans again, and Yellowstone, the traditional mecca of sightseers, is coming into its own again.

WE were a bit short on time, and of course, got to Old Faithful just after it had spouted. We didn't know that, however, and neither did a lot of other newcomers.

After sitting there on the hard ground for the better part of an hour, with nothing happening, we concluded that Old Faithful, too, had at last worn out and we were privileged to

THE King David hotel outrage in Jerusalem was the crazy deed of terrorists, and it is precisely because it was an insane act which had no relation to responsible interests that it will be a tragedy if it is allowed to becloud the great issues of a Palestine settlement.

Hope that this may not happen is to be found in British Prime Minister Attlee's statement in the house of commons yesterday. While condemning "this insane act of terrorism," the premier declared:

"His majesty's government has stated, and states again, that it will not be diverted by acts of violence in its search for a just and final solution of this problem."

Simultaneously a stunned Jerusalem—Jews, Arabs and Christians—condemned the deed in no uncertain terms. The Palestine Post, which is the voice of official Zionism, declared that "the crazed calculations of men who have broken with their cause have weighted the air with horror."

Jewish Casualties Included MEANTIME the police have been combing the thousand and one nooks and crannies of the ancient city of David for the assassins who are responsible for the murder of some half hundred people and the injury of many others.

The catastrophe came at a moment when American and British experts were meeting in London to consider ways and means of working out a Palestine settlement.

Incumbents Swept Out In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 24 (AP)—A wave of "anti-incumbent" sentiment swept three veteran democratic congressmen and three long-time state officials from office in yesterday's Oklahoma runoff primary election.

Personalities were the only issues in the races. No outstanding state or national questions were raised.

In addition to voting the veteran officeholders out, the state's democrats picked Roy J. Turner, wealthy Oklahoma City oil and cattle man, as their nominee for governor in the Nov. 5 general election.

Turner will face Olney F. Flynn, former Tulsa mayor, who won the republican nomination in the first primary, July 2.

PROSECUTOR DEFEATED Turner was chosen over Divie Gilmer, Tulsa county prosecutor. Unofficial returns from 3586 of the state's 3701 precincts gave Turner 190,328, Gilmer 168,345.

DEFEATED WERE CONGRESSMEN Jed Johnson, in the house 20 years; Lyle Boren, in congress 10 years, and Victor Wickersham, a house member five years.

Johnson was beaten by District Judge Toby Morris of Lawton, who was making his fourth race against the veteran congressman. Youthful attorneys and World War II veterans Glen D. Johnson and Preston E. Peden were chosen democratic nominees to supplant Boren and Wickersham, respectively.

IN A race which only the official returns may decide, Carl Albert, McAlester attorney, led Bill Steyer, Durant attorney, by 184 votes in the race to succeed retiring Rep. Paul Stewart, third district democrat. Twenty-two precincts were still out.
