

Pearl Harbor Vet Released

Witness of the Pearl Harbor attack and participant in seven major Pacific engagements, Samuel R. Warren Jr., 27, aviation machinist's mate first class, of Klamath Falls, Oregon, was discharged Friday, July 19, at the Jacksonville, Florida, naval personnel separation center.

Warren entered the service in July, 1940, and after his preliminary training at San Diego, Calif., was assigned to the light cruiser Honolulu for duty in the Pacific. He was aboard the ship at Pearl Harbor when the Japs made their attack and as a member of the gun crew saw action throughout the raid.

Later Warren saw action aboard the cruiser in several operations in the Solomon islands and participated in the bombardments of Aitua and Kiska in the Aleutian islands.

Transferred to the seaplane tender Curtiss late in 1943, he took part in operations against the Marshall Islands and Saipan, Tinian and Guam in the Marianas.

The veteran wears five ribbons, the Asiatic-Pacific with seven battle stars, the American Defense with one star, the American Theater, Victory, and Good Conduct.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel R. Warren Sr., of 2441 South 6th street, Klamath Falls.

Dock Workers End Slowdown

PORTLAND, July 25 (AP)—Portland longshoremen are satisfied that employers are making every effort to get retroactive pay checks for workers as fast as possible, Maurice Fisher, secretary of the CIO union, said today, and it appeared that a week-old slowdown was tapering off or had ended.

Fisher said the problem of delays in getting retroactive pay covering from October, 1944, to November, 1945, was discussed at a union meeting last night

and members agreed that employers "are doing all they can to get the checks as fast as they can."

Employers said the checks, due July 15, were held up when governmental agencies for whom the work was done failed to post money to cover them.

R. E. Ferguson, Portland waterfront association manager, could not be reached immediately for comment on whether the slowdown had ended, but waterfront sources said work was at a faster tempo yesterday. Fisher said "I don't think there are any complaints."

He said the slowdown was an individual action, not authorized by the union.
