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Small Per Cent Of Balloons Reached Coast Of America

TOKYO, July 25 (AP)—Three to five per cent of the 9000 bombing balloons launched by the Japanese from the east coast of Honshu during the war are known to have reached the North American continent, Maj. Gen. H. J. Casey said today.

General Casey, chief engineer for U. S. army forces in the Pacific, said many landed in remote places and may never be found.

Japan's free balloon campaign became ineffectual because of B-29 destruction of hydrogen producing facilities. When the Japanese decided the missiles were not so effective as they had hoped, they abandoned the program altogether.

Casey said the Japanese developed free balloons as bomb carriers as far back as 1933. Production was intensified after the Doolittle raid on the Japanese mainland in April, 1942.

AFL Meeting Will 'Cause Earthquake'

SEATTLE, July 25 (AP)—A meeting, scheduled this Friday of representatives of every AFL union in the state will produce enough news "to cause an earthquake," President E. M. Weston of the Washington State Federation of Labor told newsmen last night.

Weston said the AFL conferees Friday will "take some definite action" on what he called "unjustifiable CIO tactics."

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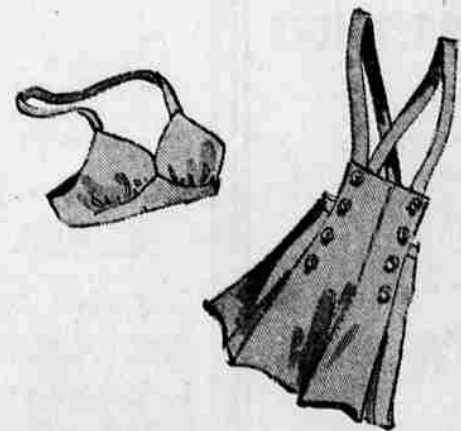
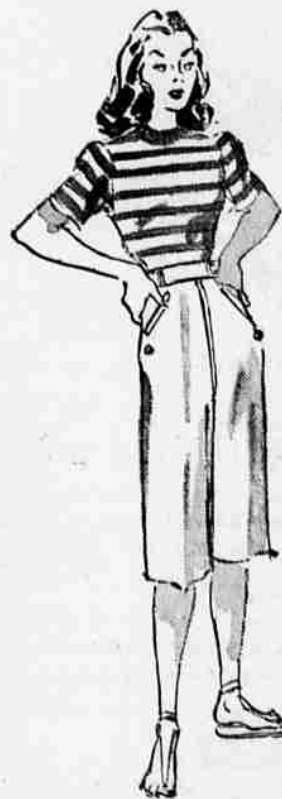
