Ordered From Car
Harrison stopped the car at the entrance to the bridge, and the armed men ordered the two negro men from the car and proceeded down a side road. Harrison and the two negro women were held at the automobile.

Then Harrison heard one of the men in the armed band remark that one of the negro women had recognized him, and several of the men came back and took the women from the car.

Harrison then heard shots. After the shots, the mob dispersed, and Harrison went back two miles toward Monroe and called Sheriff Gordon from a country store.

The sheriff said he went to the scene immediately and found the bullet-riddled bodies in the bushes along the side road about 40 feet from where Harrison's car had been parked at the entrance to the bridge.

The sheriff quoted Harrison as saying none of the men wore a mask.

Sheriff Gordon said that without identification of any members of the armed band, he had gone as far as he could with his investigation. He said he had called in the Georgia bureau of investigation, a division of the state police, and that the federal bureau of investigation had called him.

Revived OPA Ups Prices, Lifts Curbs

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be reviewed under standards set up by the new OPA law. Included were increases ranging from 6 to 8 cents a ton on coal, coke, anthracite and similar solid fuels. Some retail shoe price ceilings were upped about 8 per cent.

Stripped from the controlled list were such miscellaneous items as household television sets, rubber floor mats, umbrella frames and certain types of clocks.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) called today for an immediate announcement that beef and grain ceilings will not be restored. He issued a statement saying that President Truman had "signed a price control bill far more inflationary than the one he vetoed on June 29."

In a point-by-point analysis of the new law with the original extension measure, Taft contended that food price in-

creases which have taken place since the veto are likely to become permanent.

Lumber Faces Strike Threat

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26 (AP)—Opening of all Pacific northwest CIO fir and pine contracts for wage negotiations and threat of a strike over vacation clause interpretations today threatened to end the brief stability in the lumber industry's labor relations.

James E. Fadling, president of the International Woodworkers of America, said the contracts negotiated this spring after 40,000 woods and mill workers had backed demands with a strike vote, would be reopened August 1, but that no specific pay increase demands would be made until the effect of new price control legislation on living costs became apparent.

On vacations, he said employers rejected a union contention that the dates should be set by agreement. He said locals had been advised to strike if necessary to gain their point.

Freighter Burning Off Mexican Coast

SEATTLE, July 26 (AP)—The Luckenbach line's intercoastal freighter, El Salvador, bound here and for other west coast ports, was reported afire today, 12 miles off Mexico's Magdalena bay, 650 miles south of Los Angeles harbor. A coast guard cutter, a southbound tanker, and a coast guard flying boat sped to her aid. Agents said she had 4000 tons of cargo for Seattle. She was due in Los Angeles Monday and in Seattle August 4. She is commanded by Capt. Ben Leverock.
