Japs 'Surprised' At Atrocity Acts

PORTLAND, July 26 (AP)—High ranking Japanese expressed "surprise, shock and chagrin" at the atrocities committed by their troops and revealed in the trial of Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, Maj. Robert M. Kerr, chief prosecutor in the trial, told City club members today.

"The Japanese do recognize the difference between right and wrong. Even Yamashita admitted that the subjection of civilians to terrorism, as the Filipinos were, was wrong," Kerr reported.

The atrocities were committed in Manila streets as the natives prepared to welcome approaching American forces, Kerr said, and were thoroughly organized and not committed in the heat of battle.

Gromyko Firm On Atom Plan

NEW YORK, July 26 (AP)—Soviet Russia, in the face of overwhelming opposition, prepared today to seek a showdown on her proposal for an international convention outlawing the production and use of atomic weapons.

Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko, who two days ago rejected the key points of the U. S. atomic control plan, was scheduled to open debate on his own proposal before a committee of the United Nations atomic energy commission at 1 p. m. (PST).

The Russian plan already has been discussed both formally and informally by the 12 delegates and so far has been supported only by Poland. It appeared, therefore, that the proposal had little or no chance of approval.

Gromyko, however, has continued to stick to his own plan and, at his request, it was placed on the agenda of atomic commission committee No. 2, which is charged with the task of drafting an atomic control plan.

A U. S. spokesman, emphasizing that the American delegation had in no way changed its position as a result of Gromyko's opposition to the Baruch plan, said: "We will now let Gromyko carry the ball for a while and listen to what all the delegates have to say about his proposals."
