

Festivities Mark Shift Of Airfield At Lakeview

Lt. Comdr. Fitzpatrick, commander of the Klamath naval air station, formally presented the Lakeview airfield to Mayor Lyle North during the ceremonies yesterday. Leo G. Devaney, director of the state board of aeronautics, presented the NAA charter for the field at the same time.

Approximately 40 planes were present for the event, with one coming from as far as Chicago. Twenty Klamath planes had attended the meet on Saturday, and the Wallan Flying Service remained in Lakeview to help out with the flying and demonstration of models.

High point of the show was a simulated dog fight between a PT-19 piloted by Andy Silani and Gene Durant and a new Er-coupe, flown by Penny Payne and Jack Elle, both planes of the Wallan Flying Service. Following the dog fight Silani put on a stunt show in a PT-19. Stunt flights were also flown by Steve Bagley, of Alturas, in a BT-13 and Carter Fetsch of Lakeview in an N3N.

A crowd of between 2000 and 3000 people attended the Sunday show, and a crowd estimated at over 1000 attended the Saturday night dance at the hangar. The model plane demonstration and contest was postponed because of weather and

Green, Cashmere; and William Deming, Bellingham, for one year terms. C. G. Greene, Spokane; Ray W. Burch and G. O. Kildow, Coeur d'Alene, two-year members, and Roderick Jones, Spokane, Donald A. Vallahan, Wallace, and Commodore Kelly, three-year terms. M. C. Strauss, Spokane, was named secretary-treasurer.

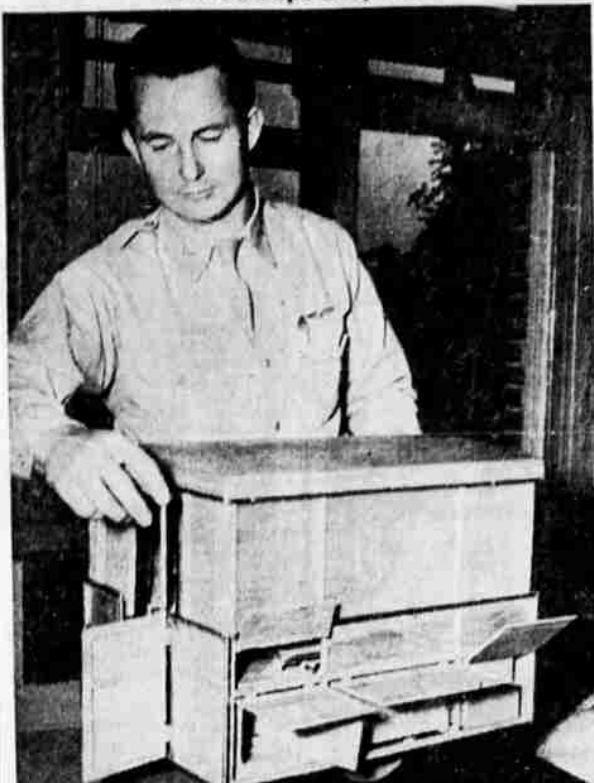
Infant Dies In Fire At Farm Labor Camp

HILLSBORO, July 29 (AP)—The infant son of a farm labor camp family was burned to death in a tent at the south edge of town yesterday while his parents worked in harvest fields.

Deputy Coroner James Bierick reported the child, Courtney Robert Cantrell Jr., 1 1/2 years, was burned beyond recognition when flames destroyed the tent where he slept. Two older youngsters fled the tent and received only minor burns. The cause was undetermined.

Street Work On Schedule

Work on the South Sixth street widening program is progressing according to the expected schedule, according to highway officials, and paving is expected to begin this fall.

The street is being prepared for rock on the north side from both ends of the project, with grading under way. The dirt will be dug out from the paving line to the edge of the right-of-way, and then filled with rock. Five inches of talus rock will be used first, followed by six inches of crushed rock, and a final layer of four inches of asphaltic concrete.

Work is in full swing now, having been held up for several weeks due to the inability of contractors to get houses moved back. All houses have been moved now with the exception of one service station, and this will be moved or dismantled in the next few days.

When the north side of the street has been finished it may be oiled and traffic routed down this way, or traffic may be detoured around the section. No paving will be done, however, until the entire street is ready to be worked on at once.

Between 50 and 75 men are on the job at present, including crews from both Copco and the phone company. Approximately 90 per cent of the underground sewers, drains and conduits have been installed, and about 90 per cent of the clearing has been completed.
