Low Fares Offered By Air Line

When United Air Lines inaugurates daily flight schedules out of Klamath Falls on August 1, business and pleasure travelers will be able to take advantage of the lowest fares in the history of air transportation. These fares—generally below the cost of rail one-way plus Pullman—apply between 60

cities on United's coast-to-coast and Pacific coast system. As examples, the one-way fare from Klamath Falls to Salem will be only \$9.70; to either Portland or San Francisco, \$12.15; to Los Angeles, \$27.30, and to Seattle, \$18.40. On coast-to-coast flights, United's fares will be equally low. The one-way fare to Denver will be \$34.20; to Chicago, \$85.45, and to New York, \$118.30. All fares are subject to 15 per cent federal tax. Since 1941, United has reduced passenger fares by more than 24 per cent, the latest reduction having been a 41 per cent drop last fall.
