Committee Approves Salmon Spawn Draft

SEATTLE, July 30 (AP)—The senate commerce committee has approved a \$390,000 appropriation to improve lower Columbia river tributary salmon spawning grounds. State Fisheries Director Milo Moore said yesterday he had been informed by Sen. Hugh Mitchell. The appropriation is being sought, Moore said, by Washington and Oregon to aid in increasing salmon runs in the lower tributaries to offset damage by power and reclamation projects.

Price lists for fresh fruits and vegetables will be revised and reissued by Aug. 1, he said. Dry grocery items and others will be ready in about 10 days.
