

Snell Plans To Attend Field Day

Governor Snell will be at the Klamath experimental area field day on August 1. Representatives of the agricultural experiment station at Oregon State college are also expected to attend this annual feature of the station.

This year the amount of time allotted for the field day is being extended. The tour of the station area will begin at 10 a. m. and continue until about 4:30 p. m. A lunch will be served at noon. At this time there will be some short talks and an opportunity for general discussion of the experimental project.

The potato disease nursery that is being conducted in cooperation with the county agent's office is at present a striking demonstration of the damage done by potato diseases. "Every potato grower in the Klamath basin should see this demonstration," said County Agent C. A. Henderson.

The chemical treatments for celworm infested land are showing a definite stimulation of vegetative growth in the potato vines.

The fall sown cereal crops are ripening rapidly and some of the spring varieties are near the ripening stage. Differences in date of ripening of a large number of wheat, oat, and barley varieties can readily be seen.

An invitation is extended to all interested in the county's agriculture to attend this field day. Come and make a day of it.

GRANTS PASS, July 30 (AP)—After electing a new slate of officers for the coming year and adopting a series of resolutions, delegates to the state convention of Rural Letter Carriers association of Oregon ended their business sessions here last Saturday night.

Heading the group for next year is Luther D. Cook, Salem, president. Other officers are Ellis Baker, Dundee, first vice president; Lloyd A. Ferrell, Grants Pass, second vice president, and Robert R. Leonard, Hood River, re-elected as secretary-treasurer.

A resolution to increase annuities for retired rural carriers who are now receiving an allowance based on prewar living costs was adopted by the group. Other resolutions adopted were: the establishment of a widow's annuity by deducting necessary funds from the carriers' salaries and one to place the carriers on a five-day work week placing them on a par with other modern business enterprises.

William A. McNeal, The Dalles, was elected to serve as editor of the carriers' official newspaper, "The Beaver Bulletin." Bob Taylor was elected as a delegate to attend the national convention to be held in Des Moines, Ia., the latter part of August.

ASTORIA, July 30 (AP)—Work of refloating the grounded Luckenbach freighter Silverbow resumed today in Young's bay where harbor tug crews are assisting in laying a kedge anchor to pull the ship off the mud bank.

The freighter ran aground during high tide Sunday when its steering mechanism broke after discharging the river pilot and before the bar pilot boarded to direct the San Francisco-bound vessel out of the harbor.

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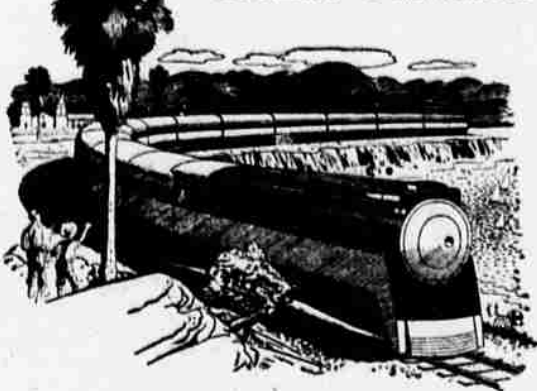
