

# Brooklyn Gets Jump On Cards

Leo Durocher's Brooklyn is riding high today, bouncing along on a 3 1/2-game lead with Howie Pollet, the best St. Louis Cardinal hurler, out of the way.  
When Lippy Leo's dandies dumped Pollet in last night's series opener, 2-1, they struck a mighty blow in defense of their world series aspirations.  
Eddie Dyer needed a clean sweep of the three-game set at Ebbets field to snatch first place from the precocious Dodgers but now the best he can do is cut the margin to 1 1/2 games by tomorrow night.  
Rube Melton, Durocher's long shot starting choice, got home with his first win of the season although he needed bullpen help from dependable Hank Behrman in the ninth.  
Once again, as is the custom in Flatbush, Dixie Walker provided the base hit that put the Brooks in the ball game, his seventh-inning single through Whitey Kurovski at third base converting Pee Wee Reese's triple into the tying score. Then Carl Furillo, a paid up member of the Riekey Youth society, bounced a ground rules double into the left field seats to apply the clincher.  
**Pinch Single**  
Chicago lost ground in the race by bowing to the New York Giants, 3-2, on Pinch Hitter Goody Rosen's single with the bases loaded in the ninth. It was the fourth time the Ottomans had topped the Cubs in 16 meetings, Junior Thompson taking the decision over Bob Chipman, another reliever. As a result the Bruins trail the Dodgers by 7 1/2 lengths.  
Schoolboy Rowe chalked up his 11th triumph for the Phillies over Cincinnati, 8-4, with Andy Selminick's bat booming for four hits including a three-run homer. Del Ennis also clouted a home run off Johnny Vander Meer. A scheduled Pittsburgh-Boston night game was postponed because of rain.  
Interest in the American league turned to the second place battle between the New York Yankees and Detroit Tigers as the Boston Red Sox increased their lead to 12 1/2 games by blanking Cleveland, 4-0. The largest crowd of the Cleveland season, 56,000, watched Dave Ferriss track up No. 17 on a three-hit verdict over Steve Gromek. Teddy Williams cracked his 28th homer and Glen Russell his fourth in the Sox's 70th win.  
**Trucks Fans 13**  
Virgil Trucks fanned 13 Yanks in earning his 12th success, 6-5 to the delight of a twilight throng of 39,831. Four-basers by Tommy Hendrick, Charley Keller and Aaron Robinson kept the New Yorkers in the ball game. The Bengals now are only one game behind the Yanks.  
Jeff Heath's home run blast with two mates on gave St. Louis a 6-3 edge over Washington in 11 innings and a victory for Stan Ferris over Marino Pieretti in a free-hitting contest.  
Philadelphia chased Frank Pappish with a six-run seventh inning to down the White Sox, 9-2. Sam Chapman's round-tripper with two on was the big blow that doomed Chicago.

# Ursal Snapp Outpoints Mel Spencer

Ursal Snapp last night came through his lighthavy encounter with Tacoma's Mel Spencer without a scratch and with a clear-cut five round decision but all his steam failed to either knock down or materially damage the tough colored boy.  
Snapp outboxed and carried the fight to Spencer all the way, taking four rounds without a doubt. The third heat, Spencer's best, might have been called a draw. About that time he was becoming hard to hit, rolling away or under the Merrill boy's punches.  
Snapp threw rights at Spencer's head from the start and rocked him in the first round, and in the second he connected right crosses to the jaw that should have put Spencer down. By the third, Spencer had opened up, jabbing away at Snapp's body.  
**Looks For Opening**  
In the fourth and fifth Snapp bored in, looking for an opening for a knockout punch but could never straighten Spencer up long enough to aim for his chin. Right-hand blows bounced off the tiring Tacoma boy's head but his rolling crouch kept them from being solid enough for damage.

# Jansen Wins Number 21 For Frisco

Riding high on the 21st victory of cool-headed Larry Jansen, San Francisco's joyous Seals coveted two games ahead of Oakland's stalkers today in the Pacific Coast baseball league.  
The opening game of a seven-tilt series with a potential of making or breaking a pennant bid ended last night in a breeze for the loop-leading Seals, who won 9-4 from the hapless Oaklanders.  
Although imperturbable Jansen ran into periodic trouble, he limited the Oaks to six hits in boosting his margin of wins to six above his nearest rival in the league. His mark of 21 tops all but four season records for the circuit in the last ten years, but he has ten more victories to get to equal the 1945 record of 31 turned in by former Seal Bob Joyce. Jansen has only three losses chalked against him.  
**Three Miscues**  
San Francisco batsmen pounced on Fireballer Francis Shea and his eighth-inning successor, Ambrose Palica, for 11 hits and reaped the benefits of three Oakland errors.  
Third Baseman Ted Jennings got two singles and one double, batting in one Seal run; Don White drove home two with a pair of singles, and Neil Sheridan blasted home two with a triple and raced in for a third tally on an error.  
In the second phase of the one-two punch, Manager Frank (Lefty) O'Doul of the Seals held ready for the Oaks, second-ranking Loop Hurler Cliff Melton, with 15 wins, takes the mound tonight. Manager Casey Stengel, with two wins, "lucky stiff," for the Seals, put up Floyd Spear to pitch for Oakland.  
**Beavers Bashed**  
The Seattle Rainiers struck from the loop cellar to bash the Portland Beavers 8-1 in a game which made Lou Novikoff look worth the expensive price tag that came attached to him. In his best performance since joining the Rainiers, Novikoff got three singles and a double and sacrificed in five times at bat. Glenn Elliott, on a five-hit performance, blanked the Beavers until the ninth inning.  
Third-place Los Angeles shaded the Hollywood Stars 6-4 with home runs by Ed Sauer and George Archie paying the high dividends. The Stars outbit the Angels, 12 to 11.

# KUHS Obstacle Course Is Converted For Peacetime
