Records Show Jap Ambitions

TOKYO, Aug. 1 (AP)—Prosecuting attorneys presented documents today in the war crimes trial of 27 Japanese leaders as evidence that Japan planned to dominate Manchukuo politically, economically and socially.

These documents followed others which disclosed the attitude as early as 1923 of the Kwantung army, the military spearhead of Japanese penetration.

"Let the people follow blindly"; "wield military power if necessary"; "bar existence of political parties"; "place Japanese in key positions" were among recorded expressions in the documents.

Other documents presented by Prosecution Attorney Mrs. Grace K. Llewellyn of Washington, D. C., sought to prove that Japan planned to take over the communications business in Manchuria and institute a monarchical form of government.

In 1934 the development of Manchukuo as the "base of Japan's world-wide economic expansion" was formulated after the League of Nations condemned Japanese action in Manchuria. That condemnation resulted in Japan's withdrawal from the league.

Man Drowns As Boat Upsets On Elk Lake
BEND, Aug. 1 (AP)—A sailboat upset on Elk lake east of here yesterday was fatal to Walter Suhrer, Sherwood.

Three others rescued from the water were Mrs. Suhrer, Charles E. Cleveland, retired principal of Benson Tech high school of Portland, and Mrs. Ann Draper, Portland. The two Suhrer children witnessed the accident.
