

Storms Start Modoc Blazes

Severe thunderstorms during the past week set a total of 27 fires on the Modoc national forest, according to Supervisor Reeder. All storms were accompanied by rain that reached general proportion by the end of the week. The rain reduced the fire danger to a low point so all fires were quickly brought under control by small suppression crews.

The Modoc forest fire record to date this year is 31 lightning fires, and 11 man-caused fires. This is far below normal for man-caused fires and reflects good co-operation on the part of forest users in care with fire.

There are another two months of severe fire weather so continued care is needed to avoid further fire losses.

Public Works Men To Visit

On Thursday, August 8, William A. Bowes, commissioner of public works for the city of Portland and chairman of the governor's special study committee on rural planning and zoning, will be in Klamath Falls with some members of the committee, to personally observe rural-urban conditions around this city and to hold a public hearing on proposed legislation for the solution of suburban problems that have developed around all cities in Oregon. Bowes' visit to the city is a part of a tour of a dozen cities in western Oregon for the purpose of gathering information and for sounding out public sentiment as to the type of legislation best suitable for suburban areas.

Bowes will be guest speaker at the Kiwanis club luncheon on the day of his visit. Immediately after luncheon, he and his committee members will be conducted on a tour of the suburban area to the southeast of the city. The public meeting will be held in the council chambers of the city hall at 3:15 p. m., to which all interested in suburban development are urged to come.

Special invitations are being sent out to city and county officials, members of the city planning commission, the chamber of commerce, the Junior chamber, the realty board, the Suburban league, the granges, and the farm bureau, and to members and prospective members of the state legislature as well as to city officials of Malin, Merrill and Chiloquin.
