Agents Talk On Problems Of Farmers

Problems which Oregon agriculturists may be facing in future years were under consideration at the regional conference of county agricultural agents held in Klamath Falls, July 30 and 31. The Klamath experiment station was visited by the group and activities of the Klamath county agent's office which might apply to other parts of the state were discussed.

Weed control plots, fertilization trials, grass nurseries, insect control and potato disease work examined. Representatives from the Oregon State agriculture office in Corvallis included C. W. Large Increase Reported In Value Of Farm Produce

WASHINGTON, July 31 (AP)—The American farmer grew \$2.38 worth of products in 1944 for every dollar's worth produced five years earlier, the census bureau reported today.

The nation's 5,900,000 farms averaged \$3100 each in products sold or used at home in the latter year, as compared with a 1939 average of \$1300, the bureau estimated on the basis of data from 223 countries.

The total value of farm products sold or used at home in 1944 exceeded \$18,300,000,000, representing an increase of \$10,500,000,000, said the census bureau. Here are some other highlights of the report:

Farms became larger over the war period. The 1945 average size was about 195 acres, showing a 21-acre growth from 1940. The numbers of farms of 1000 or more acres increased by 9000; the number of 180 acres or less decreased by 250,000.

Owner-operation of farms became more pronounced, especially in the south. There were 180,000 more farms operated by the owners. The number of tenant-operated farms decreased by almost 500,000.

Modern facilities became more widespread. More than 800,000 additional farms get electric service, and seven out of 10 farms had radios in 1945. Over

Farm Labor Sufficient In Oregon

As Oregon farmers ready themselves for the final lap of the 1946 harvest, J. R. Beck, state supervisor of the OSC extension service emergency farm labor program, reports that labor has not been a limiting factor in the harvest thus far although a good deal of shifting has been necessary by harvesting followers to relieve temporary labor shortages.

The fact that the Pacific coast states pay the best farm wages in the United States has been a major factor in relieving the wartime shortage of harvest workers, Beck indicates. Figures

released by California check stations recently indicated that approximately three times the number of persons were arriving in that state now as compared with the war years when the defense plants were recruiting workers from eastern states.

Washington and Oregon are also getting an unprecedented influx of out-of-state workers this year. Many of these new arrivals are working on farm harvest jobs, Beck states.

Housing is still a major attraction for harvest followers. In this respect, Beck says, the migrant camps located in some of the high labor requirement areas are proving valuable in attracting farm help.

Trainees Must Tell VA Of Job Changes

Veterans who are taking on-the-job training were advised today by the veterans administration not to quit their jobs or transfer to other employment without notifying the VA first.

Zeno Dent, VA training officer, explained that failure to do so may jeopardize a veteran's chance to resume training at a later date.

Changes are permitted only for good reasons, as the VA intends that the veteran should utilize his educational benefits primarily to further a life-long occupation, Dent pointed out.

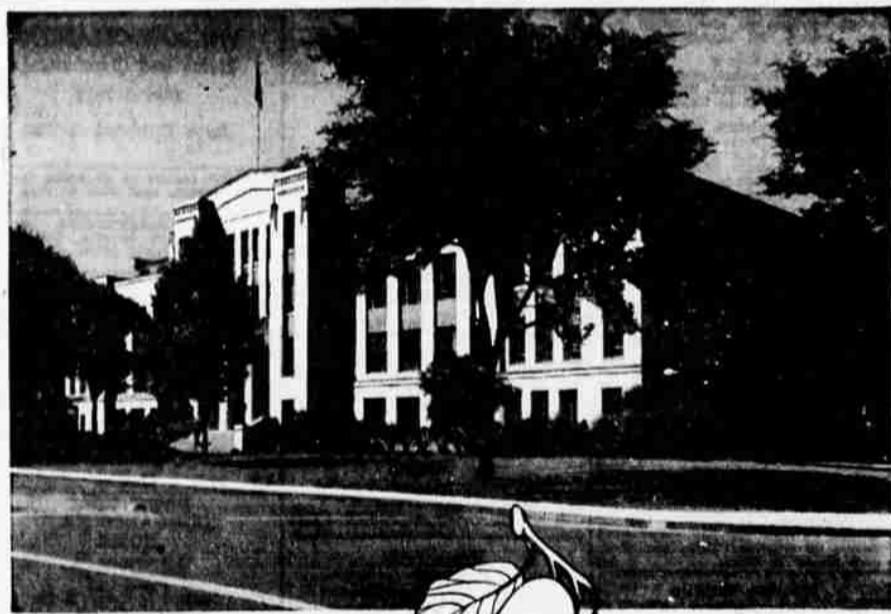
