GOP Chairman Sees Victory

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 2 (AP)—Republican National Chairman Carroll Reece, predicting certain capture of a Republican majority in the house and probably in the senate, said today the senate committee investigation of war profits has created "a bad odor around the administration."

Certain capture of a republican majority in the house and possibly control of the senate was predicted by Reece. He attributed what he called "a trend" toward republican control in part to a senate committee's investigation of Rep. Andrew J. May (D-Ky.) and a midwest munitions combine.

"The May incident was opened up to help Sen. Mead in his bid for the New York governorship. But it has backfired and created a bad odor around the administration," said Reece. He referred to issues in the coming elections as "the three C's—control, confusion and corruption," and said a fourth might be added, communism. Reece declared radicals have infiltrated into high government circles. Deficit spending by the administration also is aiding the republican cause, Reece said.

15th Air Force Gets Transfer

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Headquarters of the 15th air force have been ordered transferred to Fort George Wright, Spokane, Wash., as part of the shift which will send headquarters of the strategic air command to Colorado Springs, Colo., the army forces disclosed today. The 15th is one of two major components of the strategic command. It is headed by Brig. Gen. Charles F. Born, who served with the unit in Italy in wartime. The other is the 8th air force.

Headquarters of the strategic air command, commanded by Gen. George C. Kenny, is now at Bolling Field here.

Officials said the move is expected to be made about September 16 and was ordered primarily to relieve congestion in the national capital.

Location of strategic headquarters at a midcontinent point fits into postwar defense strategy.

Mexican Cut During Brawl

A Mexican laborer named Raymond Felix, 37, was slashed about the face and body during a drinking brawl at a cabin at 521 S. 4th early last night, and police are holding two other Mexicans and an Indian woman on drunk and disorderly charges in connection with the stabbing. Antonio Orzoco, 43, who works for Ewanna, was booked for assault with intent to kill last night at the station, where police said that he was supposed to be the one who took the pocket-knife to Felix.

Alexander Martinez, 46, and Gladys Kirk, 29, Indian from

Beatty, are listed as material witnesses to the affair.

Felix's wounds included a punctured left lung, lacerations on the right side of his face and jaw which took several stitches to close, and cuts on his left forearm. He is in the city jail booked for disorderly conduct.

Police answered a call to the cabin at 6:55 last night and found a fight in progress with Felix already cut up. They confiscated several bottles of wine found in the place.
