

# Sagebrush Eradication Under Study

The eradication of sagebrush from range land is being studied by the forest service this week in a series of tests at Coffee Pot flat on the Che-waucan river above Paisley. Several types of new equipment as well as modifications of existing equipment are being tried to find a simple and inexpensive method of ridding open lands of this weed brush. Rail drags, "A" frame drags, a Dixie harrow and a Wheatland plow are the devices being tried.

The tests are in charge of T. P. Flynn, head of the forest service equipment laboratory in Portland, and Joseph Pecharne, in charge of range research for the Pacific northwest forest and range experiment station at Portland. Officials of the Fremont forest are cooperating in the tests.

These equipment tests are part of the experimental program which the forest service is working on to find methods for improving rundown range on both public and private lands. The Fremont forest is now starting work in the Paisley district to reseed 600 acres of range to crested wheat grass this year. This grass has proved to be well adapted to dry sites and furnishes good feed for livestock. Large areas on the Fremont forest are suited to this type of reseeding and local officials are anxious to push the program as fast as funds for this purpose are made available.

# Hoss To Head Safety Drive

Dave Hoss, production manager of radio station KFJI and publicity director for the Klamath Falls Junior chamber of commerce, has been appointed state chairman for the Jaycee traffic safety program, by Merle Nash, Eugene, state president. Hoss will be in charge of outlining a state-wide traffic safety program to be carried out by the 17 chapters throughout Oregon.

Traffic safety has long been one of the major objectives of the national Junior chamber, and with the rapid increase of fatalities throughout the nation, particular emphasis this year is being placed on this part of the Jaycee civic improvement program.

Hoss stated that immediate plans would call for increased radio and newspaper participation in localized programs designed to point out and then correct existing traffic and pedestrian hazards. An active school program will be put into effect as soon as schools start this fall.

# Congress Turns Attention To Political Battlefields

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Lawmakers shifted from the legislative to the political battlefields today as the 79th congress went home expecting that it won't be back until after the November election, if ever.

The vast majority of its members, however, hoped individually to be on hand when the 80th congress is called to order in January. For most of them the opportunity to get back home and hoe political gardens was what they had been waiting for for months.

Every house seat technically is at stake in November, although some of the contests already have been decided in democratic primaries in the south. Thirty-six senate seats are to be filled, and there, too, some southern democrats have cleared their voting hurdle.

The senate bowed out with a thumping 60 to 2 vote approving a resolution authorizing the president to deposit with the United Nations this country's agreement to abide by decisions of the world court in matters pertaining to treaty interpretations, international obligations, and reparations.

The court's jurisdiction would not be accepted, however, in matters which the United States considers strictly its own domestic business. Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the foreign relations committee listed immigration and operation of the Panama canal in this category.

Neither could the court act in matters which had been or are submitted to other tribunals by agreement.

# Crater Lake Trail Opens Tomorrow

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Aug. 3 — The trail to Crater lake will be opened to the public Sunday morning, August 4. The trail crew encountered many difficulties in the form of heavy snow, rock slides and sections of trail completely washed out in the opening operations, but the 1.6 mile trail from the rim to the lake shore now has a fair margin of safety if reasonable precautions are exercised by those who use it.

For the first time since 1941 rowboats and motor launches will be available for scenic trips, fishing or for just unqualified rowing. A morning and afternoon scenic trip around the lake by motor launch is scheduled daily. The morning trip leaves the boat landing at 9:30 and returns at 11:30; the afternoon trip leaves at 1:30 and returns at 3:30. Rowboats are available by the hour or by the day, and a tow service for fishermen will be resumed this year. Launches will tow the boats of fishermen to Wizard island beginning at 8 a. m., and will bring them back either between the morning and afternoon lake trips or after 3:30 p. m. The last two services are at 4:30 p. m.

In announcing the opening of the trail, Superintendent E. P. Leavitt said: "The trail is in a reasonably safe condition but visitors are urged to use care in making the descent and ascent. Some snow and loose rocks can be expected and they must be traversed carefully to avoid slipping and falling."

Discussing the outlook for fishing, Leavitt commented: "There has been no fishing in Crater lake since the summer of 1941 to speak of and we anticipate good catches this season, both in quantity and quality." The daily limit is 12 fish per person fishing. No fishing license is required in Crater Lake National park.
