**Cottonwood Log Mill Open After Overhaul**  
LAKEVIEW, Aug. 3—After being shut down for 10 days for repairs and the building of a new green chain, the Cottonwood mill, owned and operated by George Turner, is now in full swing again.

This mill is located on the Wesley Anderson Bar W ranch up the Cottonwood dam and at the present time employs around 16 men including the crew in the woods. Several thousand feet of lumber a day has already been hauled into Lakeview to be surfaced.
