Portland OK's Power Merger

PORTLAND, Aug. 3 (AP)—Merger of Northwestern Electric company and Pacific Power and Light company held city council approval today.

The council passed a permitting ordinance after an all-day hearing in which Walter S. Babson, Northwestern Electric director, and many businessmen declared that a merger would mean lower electric rates.

The possibility that the merger might end in both companies' absorption by Washington Water Power company—posed by several speakers as an objection—was admitted by City Utilities Commissioner Dorothy McCullough Lee.

Mrs. Lee, who favors the merger, said company officials had told her transfer of the stock to Washington Water Power was a possibility. "However," she added, "I can not find that this is of any concern to the city."

The companies, which do not compete in Portland, are connected through a New York holding company, American Power and Light. The merger must now have federal and state approval.

Round-Up Set For Lakeview

LAKEVIEW, Aug. 3—With the 27th annual Lakeview Round-Up less than a month away, plans are beginning to take shape for the event on September 1 and 2, according to Gene Favell, chairman of the advertising committee.

The West Coast carnival will be in Lakeview again with a bigger and better show, according to advance reports.

A. B. Wicklund of Portland, who has done the decorating in Lakeview for many years, will be back again after an absence of several years during the war.

Several of the purses have been increased for the 1946 Round-Up as follows: Cowboy bronc riding increased from \$250 to \$300; calf roping, open, from \$150 to \$200; calf roping, Lake county, from \$150 to \$200; boys' pony race, under 12 years, from \$12 to \$20; boys' pony race, over 12 years, \$20 to \$40; chariot race, from \$70 to \$100.

The contestants again this year will be limited to Klamath, Deschutes, Harney, Modoc and Lake counties. Clifton Howard is president of the 1946 Round-Up and Gordon Barrie is arena director.

Lake County C Of C Plans Calf Pool

LAKEVIEW, Aug. 3—A pool purchase of high quality dairy calves is to be organized shortly by the agriculture committee of the Lake County chamber of commerce, as a result of a decision reached at a meeting Monday afternoon.

Purpose of the buying pool is to stimulate interest in dairying locally. The chamber also is presenting a registered dairy calf to the 4-H boy or girl showing the best dairy project at the fair.

The calves in the pool purchase will come from the Tillamook area. Although not registered, they are of high quality stock and are priced at \$17.50 each. The chamber committee is asking farmers to pay \$25 per calf into the pool, to take care of insurance and transportation. Any balance remaining will be prorated.

Orders will be accepted until the end of the year, for delivery about May 1, 1947. Farmers interested are urged to get in

touch with either the chamber of commerce or the county agent's office.

Methods of operating a central grading, packing and shipping point for wild plums also were discussed at Monday's meeting, as were various other matters.

The agriculture committee will meet again next Monday morning at 10 o'clock to discuss ways and means to further develop the weed control program in Lake county. County Judge J. R. Heckman has been asked to be present to confer on this matter with the committee.

Automobile Kills Man While Changing Tire

McMINNVILLE, Aug. 3 (AP)—A car which topped a hill and crashed into a parked car where a man was repairing a tire brought death to Vencil Lee Houdke, 25, Salem, yesterday.

Houdke, crushed between the rear of his car and the oncoming vehicle Thursday night, died in a hospital here. State police identified the other driver as Robert A. Johns, 19, Nehalem, and said he told them he could not see Houdke's car in time to stop.

Mr. Thomas was an oldtime stockman and rancher in Lake county. He was born at Santa Barbara, Calif., in 1868, later moving with his parents to Redding, where he spent his childhood. In 1887 he came to Lake county to engage in the sheep business. The homestead he took at that time, north of Gearhart mountain, still bears his name, "Lee Thomas Meadows."
