

Indians Dig Up Classy Hurler

Allie Reynolds, forced back into the shadows by the brilliancy of his illustrious pitching teammate, Bob Feller, in the last month as turned in consistently fine mound performances that would do justice to Blazing Bob himself.

In fact, the Cleveland Indians' righthander has forced the great Feller to play second fiddle during the past 30 days as the 27-year-old Oklahoman racked up six straight triumphs while Feller dropped one game in seven starts.

Reynolds gained his sixth victory in a row yesterday and the eighth of the campaign at the expense of the New York Yankees whom he defeated 3-0 for his second shutout win. The triumph enabled Cleveland to remain within hailing distance of the fourth place Washington Senators who blanked the Chicago White Sox, 6-0, with Bobo Newsom pitching.

A crowd of 35,863 watched Reynolds limit the Yanks to two hits and dump them into third place behind the Detroit Tigers who upset the Boston Red Sox.

The Tigers handed the American league-leading Red Sox their third straight defeat when Dizzy Trout outpitched Tex Hughson, 7-1. The win gave the second-place Bengals a two-point advantage over the Yankees.

Safe from the clutches of the challenging St. Louis Cardinals, who were guests of the Phillies in Philadelphia, the National league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers returned to their winning ways by edging out the Cincinnati Reds 3-2 under the Ebbets' field lights. The victory, coupled with the Cards' defeat by Ben Chapman's Phils, increased the Flocks' lead over the Redbirds to two and a half games.

The Cards failed to hold onto a 2-0 advantage as the Phils jumped on Lefty Al Brazle for six hits—five of them of the infield variety—to score three runs in the seventh inning and defeat St. Louis, 3-2.

Pittsburgh and the New York Giants divided a doubleheader at the Polo Grounds, the Giants coming back to win 3-2 after the Bucs, behind the southpaw slants of Fritz Ostermueler, had copped the opener 6-0.

The Philadelphia Athletics overcame an early two-run deficit to down the St. Louis Browns 8-3.

Rain postponed the scheduled Chicago Cubs-Boston Braves night contest.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 3 (AP)—Frank E. McKinney, 42-year-old Indianapolis businessman, is the new owner of the Pittsburgh Pirates baseball club, the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette said today.

Main group attending from Klamath Falls were 24 prospective players of the game at KUHS next year, along with Klamath coaches and some private cars from Klamath.

The bus loaded for Bend at Modoc field at 1 p. m., with a few signed up not accounted for, and reached Bend by 5 p. m. Almost the first ones through the gates of Bruin field, the prospective Pelicans gained the pick of the general admission seats.

Many of the boys seeing their first professional game, the Brooklyn Dodgers defeated themselves in style. Divided into two squads, the black team took the whites well into camp, 15-12, gaining their third touchdown through Mickey Mayne, speedy little fullback.

Coach Ed Ryan of Klamath through the game pointed out certain outstanding things about the way certain players kicked, passed, and other feats to the KUHS boys watching the game.

Bob Henderschott, one of the new coaches for the Pelicans next year, met the group of boys and attended the game with Ryan and "Dutch" French. Also, one past mentor of the Pelicans, big Frank Ramsey, was at the game merely as a spectator, he said.

Many of Oregon's best footballers saw the game, including Jake Leight of University of Oregon.

Ryan and French are staying for the second clinic by Coach Mal Stevens, to be held all day today. Bill Bowerman, coach at Medford, also attended the game and clinic, as well as athletic directors from Salem, Portland, La Grande and other towns all over the state.

Helser Sets Suds Down

Portland Vet Limits Rainiers To Two Hits

Individual baseball performances which stood out today in the Pacific Coast league came from teams lower in the standings than the San Francisco-Oakland rivals for the lead down the stretch.

Roy Helser, veteran southpaw of Portland's 1945 pennant winners, blanked the Seattle Rainiers 8-0 in the outstanding mound job last night and on the offensive did better than all of the Rainier batsmen combined.

He let Seattle have only two singles, one in the first and another in the eighth inning, and not only collected a pair of hits himself but scored each time. Portland, just one step above Seattle's cellar occupants, got 16 safeties, with Centerfielder Frank Shone's two singles, a double and a triple leading the attack.

Oakland's Acorns bounced back from their triple drubbing at the hands of first-place San Francisco for a 7-4 victory which left them three games behind the loop leaders.

Scarsella's mark of 22 home runs this season was equaled by last night's star at the plate, Lloyd Christopher of the Los Angeles Angels, who downed the Hollywood Stars, 5 to 1.

Christopher got three hits in four times at bat, and each blow went over the fence. His three homers plus another run one of them drove in accounted for the margin over the Stars.

He whacked the ball out of the park in the third, fifth and ninth frames.

The Sacramento Sojors nosed out San Diego, 7-6 on an unearned run in the ninth inning. Gene Lillard tripled and scored the winning run when Padre Shortstop Jack Lohrke fumbled Steve Mesner's grounder.

San Diego's brilliant individual effort was matched by the team display of Ohio State's 300-meter medley relay trio of Dick Fetterman, Jim Councilman and Halo Hiroi, who swam the distance in 3:20.7, shattering the old American mark of 3:22, set by the Chicago Tower club in 1940.

Braet Stroker Councilman was timed in 1:11.5 for his 100-meter stretch. The listed national mark is 1:13.

Some watches unofficially caught Hiroi at :58 flat for the 100-meter free style leg. Johnny Weissmuller's :58.8 is the national record.

College Stars Begin Work For LA Gridiron Classic

CHICAGO, Aug. 3 (AP)—Outstanding collegiate football players from all parts of the country began arriving in Chicago today to form the 87-man squad which will start training under Head Coach Bo McMillin of Indiana for the 13th annual All-Star grid classic against the Los Angeles Rams August 23.

McMillin and his staff—Wallace Butts of Georgia, Jim McLean of St. Mary's and Tuss McLaughry of Dartmouth—were on hand to greet the stars. The coaches held their first strategy session, then scheduled the initial drill for tomorrow at Northwestern's Dyche stadium.

Sectionally, the Midwest with 33 players, tops the representation on the All-Star group. Twenty-five of these players are from the Western conference—and 15 of the 33 are backs.

The south and southwest are sending 24, all being linemen with the exception of eight. The east is contributing three backs and three linemen and the far west is sending four linemen.

In all, 35 colleges and universities will be represented. Indiana, Northwestern and Notre Dame lead in representation with five players apiece. Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan will send four apiece.

The western players are Nick Suseoff, Washington State and Ralph Heywood, Southern California; Norm Veery, Southern California, and Visco Grglich, Santa Clara, guards.

Washington Coaches Will Tutor Clinic

PULLMAN, Aug. 3 (AP)—Washington State college coaches will be the tutors at a statewide football and basketball clinic starting here for three days August 22, and on its program will be the formation of an eastern Washington high school coaches' association. A state officials' group also is being planned.
