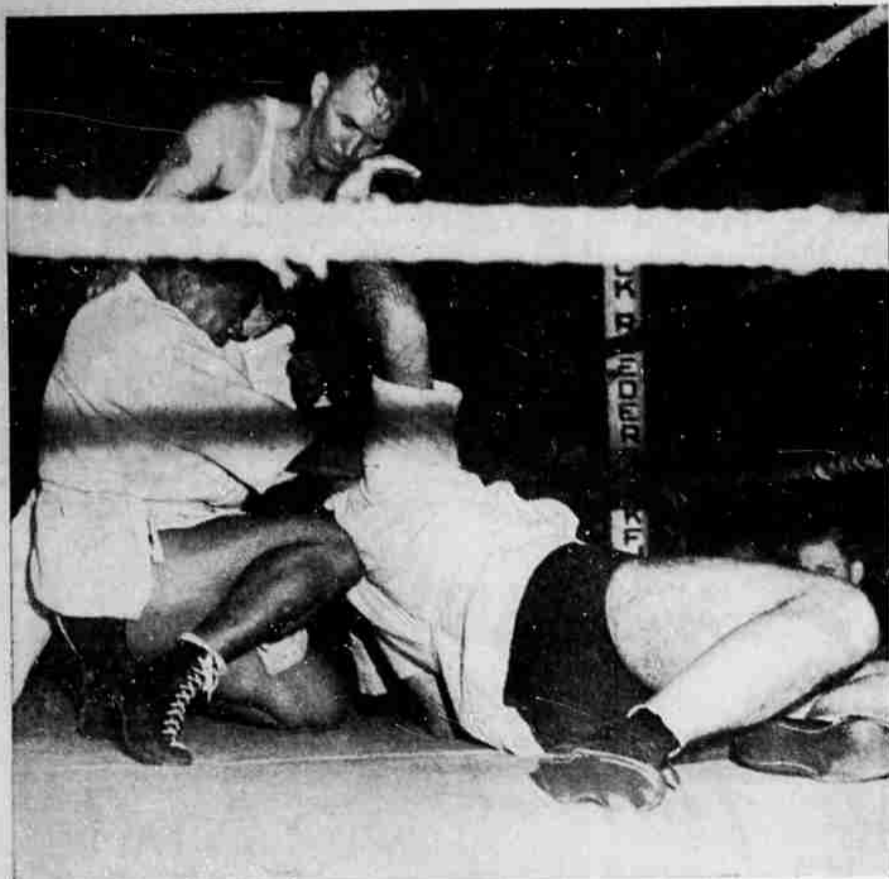


Acheiu Throttles Belcastro With Jacket

Turnstiles Click Behind 12 Million Diamond Fans

Baseball's Biggest Crowd Sees Yanks Best Indians; Feller Hurt in Game

The major league's attendance figures soared to 12,788,000 today—nearly two million more than last year's record total—following a splendid Sunday turnout featured by Cleveland's standard-shattering 75,959 crowd of which 74,592 paid.

The throng which filled Cleveland's municipal stadium for a glimpse of its pitching idol, blazing Bobby Feller, almost witnessed a tragedy when the speedball king was forced to leave the field in the seventh inning of the first game of a scheduled doubleheader with the New York Yankees when he pulled a back muscle. Feller's injury later was described as not serious and the Tribe expected him to take his regular turn next Thursday.

Feller's abrupt retirement spoiled a thrilling scoreless duel with the Yankees' Floyd (Bill) Bevens, the Cleveland ace having fanned seven to raise his strikeout total to 246 in 239 innings. With Feller out of the way, the Yankees went on to win, 2-0, getting the winning markers in the ninth inning off Bob Lemon, who had taken over for Feller. The second game was halted by rain in the top of the second inning.

Another fine crowd of 49,425 saw the American league-leading Red Sox knock Detroit's Hal Newhouser from the hill for the third time this season and by the accident to Shortstop Dick Cullen, who was hit in the face by a pitched ball in the seventh inning of the second game and was carried off the field.

With Mike Budnick and Monte Kennedy allowing the Pirates only one run, a homer by Frank Gustine, the New York Giants swept both ends of a doubleheader from Pittsburgh, 4-0 and 10-1.

The White Sox also got splendid pitching from Lefthanders Ed Smith and Frank Pappish to beat the Washington Senators twice, 3-1 and 1-0. Relief Pitcher Tom Ferrick received credit for both victories as the St. Louis Browns beat the Philadelphia Athletics twice, 6-5 and 7-4.

Bud Ward Takes Links Amateur

SPOKANE, Aug. 5 (AP)—Shooting a six-under-par 66 on his morning round was a fortunate happenstance for national amateur golf Champion Marvin "Bud" Ward of Spokane here Saturday.

Because Ward, despite his sizzling round, was only three up on 23-year-old Lieut. Ed Jones of Minneapolis, at lunch and he had to scramble all afternoon to stay ahead before finally winning on the 33rd, 4 and 3.

Jones was three under par himself on the first 18, but it wasn't good enough to shackle the Spokane shotmaker. Both played raggedly in the afternoon, being out in 38 holes apiece with Ward still clinging to his three-hole margin. Bud boosted his lead to four holes a couple of times on the final stretch, only to have Jones come back. The march ended when Ward's erratic putter finally found the range with a 12-footer for a birdie 3 and victory.

San Francisco's bid for her first Pacific Coast league pennant since 1935 loomed more impressive today against the backdrop of a record-breaking series in which the Seals humbled second-place Oakland and increased their loop leadership to four games.

The host Seals won the series, five games to Oakland's two. Yesterday the two teams played another of their trans-bay "commuter" doubleheaders. Even without the 10,156 patrons at the morning game in Oakland, the six games played on Seal soil topped the hundred thousand mark for the first time in the history of any Coast league series.

Francis Shea hurled the Acorns to a 6-3 victory in the game at Oakland. The losing pitcher was Frank Rosso, who was charged with dropping both the games the Seals lost to their cross-bay rivals.

With Lefty Larry Jansen hurling eight-hit ball in the second game, the Seals closed out the series in their home park with a 6-1 victory. It was Jansen's twenty-second win of the season. Sacramento won its series with San Diego, seven games to one, and by virtue of their double win yesterday the Solons gained the upper division and replaced Hollywood in fourth place. The Solons choked off a ninth inning San Diego rally to win the first game, 6-3, and a four-run home run by Bill Conroy helped them win the nightcap, 12-7.

Third-place Los Angeles maul-ed Hollywood, winning the series, 6-1. The Stars' meager solace was in their winning yesterday's nightcap 11-0 to end a seven-game losing streak, with Eddie Erault allowing the Angels only three hits. The Angels won the first game of the double bill, 4-3.

The doormat Seattle Rainiers rose against their northern brethren, the Portland Beavers, and blasted the seventh-place Oregonians twice yesterday. The Rainiers spotted Portland a 2-0 lead and, on the strength of two wild pitches by Portland's Jake Mooty and three successive singles, went on to win the first game 3-2.

In the extra eighth inning of the nightcap, Portland Pitcher Carl Fischer walked Ned Stickle with the bases loaded to force in the winning run as Seattle triumphed, 1-0.
