

Lake Home Owners Talk On Problems

The Lake of the Woods Home Owners' association at a well-attended meeting at Lake of the Woods lodge, Sunday afternoon approved an increase in the annual dues from \$5 to \$15 as a background or basis for effective organizational work and the establishment of a number of committees.

An important topic discussed was the stocking of the lake with game fish. There was a report from the fish and game commission to the effect that efforts would be made to make this a good fishing resort. This was backed up by the number of the commission's biologists who have been checking the lake for the past three or four weeks. On a resolution the following committee was appointed to work with and lend every possible encouragement to the fish and game commission to the end that the lake may be extensively stocked: Don Provost, Ashland; Tom Neely, Medford; Frank Peyton, Klamath Falls; Claude Davis, Klamath Falls and James R. Rogers, Santa Cruz.

Improvement of the roads into the lake from Klamath Falls, Ashland and Medford was discussed at great length and the state highway commission and the Klamath county court were voted the thanks of the association for the improvements that have been made this year. The need for further development was stressed and committees for the coming year were appointed: Ed Dunham, general chairman; Frank Newman, chairman, valley subcommittee, with M. O. Binsette, Bill Briggs, David Holmes, John Houston, chairman, Klamath county subcommittee; Mitchell Tillotson, Jack Dutcher, Dr. Cecil Adams, Clarence Humble, Mrs. Rose Poole.

Water Traffic Studied
The need for some kind of self-regulation with respect to high powered boats and water trailers such as ski ropes and surf board ropes was discussed and the opinion favored that the study of some such rules that could be used for the guidance for those who have boats on the lake as well as those bringing boats in from time to time.

A committee consisting of Troy Cook, chairman; Heinie Fluhrer, Maude Liskey, Ed Geary and Wesley Lorenz was appointed. This committee will meet next Sunday, August 11, at the summer home of Glen Lorenz on the west side of the lake at 11 in the morning to draw tentative regulations which will be offered to the members for their approval. The owners of the Lake of the Woods lodge were invited to participate as members of the association and it's probable that invitations will also be issued to similar institutions having property on the lake, such as the resorts of Medford and Klamath Falls and the Salvation Army. By unanimous vote the officers and directors from the previous year were continued for next year. These consist of E. P. Ivory, Klamath Falls, president; Lloyd Prock, Klamath Falls, secretary-treasurer and directors: G. C. Lorenz, Klamath Falls, Don Provost, Ashland and W. B. Barnum, Medford.

Home Builder Flays Housing Management

PORTLAND, Aug. 6 (AP)—The executive vice president of the National Association of Home Builders charged last night that the housing program was bogging down because of poor management. Frank W. Cortright, Washington, D. C., declared that, in the face of a 500 per cent boost needed in building materials, failure to raise prices had cut the supply of doors 27 per cent in seven months.

Cortright blamed National Housing Expediter Wilson Wyatt with "failure to act when necessary." He spoke before the Portland Homebuilders' association and Portland realty board.

Jimmy James To Play Here

Coming direct to Klamath Falls from Horace Heidt's 117-room ballroom, one of southern California's showplaces, is Jimmy James and his orchestra who make their first stop on his first northwest tour here at the armory Wednesday night.

James will be accompanied by many ex-G.I.'s as the musical director of the famous "Jeep Show" which starred Mickey Rooney and Bobby Breen. The "Jeep Show" was the army's answer to the need for top flight entertainment for the front line troops. This show spent several months in the European theater of operations doing as many as 12 performances a day and many times within 500 to 400 yards of the fox holes.
