

Kaiser Would Welcome Inquiry On War Record

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 7 (AP)—Henry J. Kaiser, west coast wartime shipbuilder, asserted today he was eager to have his war record investigated, as suggested by New Hampshire Senator Styles Bridges. In turn he called for an investigation of the steel industry's war record and

SEATTLE, Aug. 7 (AP)—Republican National Chairman Carroll Reece said today in an interview that he favored a Mead committee inquiry into the wartime profits of the Henry J. Kaiser enterprises.

He mentioned specifically a desire to see the congressional committee ask questions about what he said were "huge loans to the Kaiser enterprises."

He threw in Jesse Jones and his Reconstruction Finance corporation.

Asked if he welcomed investigation, he replied:

"I am eager for it. If there is a stronger word, use it."

In short, Kaiser charged "scandal mongers" with trying to "assassinate" his reputation and ruin the Fontana plant. An investigation, he said, might bring out who the "character assassins" are that were responsible for "a flood of articles sent to the press," some of which he showed the reporters.

"Was this campaign evidence that somebody was out to kill your Fontana plant?" he was asked.

"There isn't any question," Kaiser replied. "The facts have proven it."

Kaiser, in a prepared statement, complimented the merchant marine and fisheries committee investigation, headed by

Rep. S. O. Bland, said he would "most willingly" appear before the senate Mead investigating committee and added:

"I hope congress will then want another investigation, so that the people will know the facts about steel."

"During the war, Kaiser shipyards were short of steel. The great steel corporations failed to provide the necessary steel for ships. They had shipyards of their own. Kaiser must be stopped was the slogan."

"There exists sworn evidence that a representative of the Defense Plant corporation, under the control of Jesse Jones of the RFC, said to me: I will never recommend spending government money on a steel plant in California to be operated by the U. S. Steel corporation spend government money in Utah on a steel plant to be operated by them."

Asked who said that, Kaiser said "William Allen, special consultant to Jesse Jones."

Then Kaiser told reporters he built the Fontana plant with \$14,155,000 borrowed from the RFC and produced more steel at Fontana than U. S. Steel did at Geneva with a \$200,000,000 outlay of government money.

"Now they hold us for every cent of the Fontana cost, with interest, to be paid back to the government. But they let U. S. Steel buy the Geneva plant for 20 cents on the dollar and with no interest on the government investment," Kaiser said.

Kaiser said he had paid \$17,780,000 on the principal of the Fontana loan, had paid interest at 4 per cent and had earmarked \$18,000,000 more for payment to the government.

"We built \$100,000,000 worth of houses for the government for a fee of \$2," Kaiser told the newsmen and then added: "We didn't get the \$2."
