Liquor Case Hearing Held At Dorris

DORRIS, Aug. 9.—On complaint of Dewey Egan, of Redding, district administrator for the liquor license division of the state board of equalization, a hearing was held in Dorris Wednesday afternoon on the issue of revoking the license of Bob Davidson, operator of the Dorris Cafe and Bar.

E. A. McDonald, of San Francisco, state referee for the state board of equalization, presided at the hearing. George Berger, of Oakland, state reporter, made a transcript of the evidence for presentation to the state board, which meets in Sacramento on August 22.

The complaint against Davidson charged that on March 16, 1946, he had sold liquor to two Klamath Falls, Oregon, youths, who later had attempted to hold up the barkeeper. Testimony by local law enforcement officers disclosed that Davidson was frequently drinking behind the bar and often too drunk to take care of his business. He had previously on two occasions paid local fines for violating state liquor laws.

Warnings Issued
Egan testified that he had several times warned Davidson to be careful of violations, and that if they persisted, would be forced to take action toward revocation of his license.

A transcript of the evidence and testimony will be presented to the state board of equalization meeting at Sacramento on August 22, at which time a decision will be made. In the event of an adverse decision, Referee McDonald explained that Davidson may appeal the verdict. Until that time, he may retain his license and sale rights.

Davidson was involved last week with the state department of public health, when Inspector J. O. McPheeters of Sacramento, closed up his place of business until such time as it conformed to state sanitary regulations. Davidson was fined \$100 in police court after he pled guilty to the charge.

Dorris Plant And Sawmill To Be Closed By Long-Bell

DORRIS, Aug. 9.—J. M. White of Weed, general manager of the Long-Bell Lumber company, announced this week that the Dorris plant and sawmill would be closed indefinitely.

The mill has been operating for the past several months with only a skeleton crew. White said future plans for the operation of the local plant were indefinite.

For the present, W. F. Bethune of Klamath Falls, paymaster, will handle routine business for the Dorris office.

Charles M. Floberg, superintendent, and his family left Monday for Portland to make their home. For the past year, Floberg was superintendent of the Dorris mill, and for the five years previous was assistant superintendent. Floberg came to Dorris from LaGrande, Oregon, where he was associated for 30 years with the Bowman-Hicks Lumber company, of which 18 years were spent as assistant superintendent.

Closing of the Long-Bell mill leaves Dorris, a town which in

the heyday of big timber had as many as a half dozen lumber mills, with but one major operation, the Associated Lumber and Box Factory, a subsidiary of the American Box company of San Francisco. The Dorris Lumber and Moulding company, with headquarters in Sacramento, is a lumber processing plant, and has no woods or mill operations.
