

Slaughter Resumes Lead In New Investigation Of Surplus Goods Disposal

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Deafened Rep. Slaughter headed back to Capitol Hill today to resume personal direction of inquiry billed as likely to put "several persons, in government and otherwise, in a tight position."

The quoted words are those of Hugh D. Wise Jr., general counsel for the house committee investigating surplus property disposal.

The committee's chairman is Slaughter, the Missouri democrat whom President Truman successfully marked for defeat in Tuesday's primary election.

Meanwhile, the possibility of a fresh disposal sensation—a near "corner" on the surplus aluminum market—was raised even as Wise was announcing the postponement of today's

scheduled house committee session to permit Slaughter to take over next Monday.

Current Situation

Here is the situation on the two, and as yet unrelated, fronts:

1. The war assets administration froze deliveries of surplus aluminum sheet in several midwestern and southwestern states pending a WAA-FBI investigation of purchases under which the disposal agency said one or two companies might have "cornered" the market.

A WAA spokesman told a reporter that 43 persons or more were using veterans' priority certificates to buy large quantities of the scarce sheet from surplus stocks. The bulk of these purchases later were offered to a single midwest concern, its identity not disclosed.

2. The Slaughter committee announced that Promoter Benjamin F. Fields, whose name has figured in the senate war investigating committee's inquiry into the Garsson munitions combine, will be its first witness next week.

Fields is to be questioned about the purchase from WAA of 539 rolls of scarce wire screen needed in the veterans housing program. The WAA has announced that Fields bid "corresponded almost exactly" with the amount on hand at a Richmond, Va., surplus depot.

GOP Success Seen By Reece

COEUR D'ALENE, Ida., Aug. 9 (AP)—Predicting election of a republican congressional delegation from both Idaho and Washington states, Carroll B. Reece, republican national committee chairman, told a breakfast meeting of north Idaho party leaders that a republican-controlled congress would promote these policies:

Drastic reduction in government bureaus; removal of legal red tape "hampering" removal of subversives from government positions; an early end of "unjustifiable controls upon production and distribution"; opportunities for veterans to obtain employment at good wages; protection of state and local government rights; "an end to secret dealings with foreign governments"; immediate reduction of individual income taxes and an end to deficit spending.

Japs Win Permission To Go After Whales

TOKYO, Aug. 9 (AP)—The Japanese will be permitted to go whaling again in the Antarctic next December.

Allied headquarters today authorized a fleet of two factory ships, 12 whalers and seven carrier boats to make a 6000-mile trip for a 1946-47 whaling season "down under."

The government was notified, however, that this does not establish a precedent for operations in said area or any other area for any subsequent period.

Nor was it an expression of allied policy relative to the determination of national jurisdiction boundaries or fishing rights.

Fibre-Glass Clothes To Be Tried By Army

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Army clothing and boots lined with fibre-glass will be tested in Alaska and the Aleutians this winter as a protection against extreme cold.

The war department said today the material is expected to prove much warmer and lighter than present wool and cotton garments.

An army observer who wore an experimental parka lined with fibre-glass in last winter's "musk ox" expedition in northern Canada reported it afforded comfort even if the temperature dropped to 40 degrees below zero.

Dutch Now Sailing Ex-German Liner

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—The former German liner, Wupperthal, now flying the Dutch flag as the Noesa-Niwi, is here loading 900 tons of canned goods for Batavia, Java.

The Hamburg-built vessel was taken over by the Dutch in Sumatra after Hitler's paratroopers and panzers invaded Holland. During the conflict the ship carried supplies between U. S. and English ports and to African and Middle East points.

GI FLYERS

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—The veterans' administration reported today more than 700 Oregonians are taking flying lessons under terms provided by the GI bill of rights at 17 different flight schools.

Scout Writes About Ranch

Leonard Weber Jr. of Malin troop 33 wrote recently to the Modoc area council of his experiences at the national Boy Scout ranch in Cimarron, N. M. "Tomorrow we leave Rancho Reyado by pack mule," said Weber. "There are 27 Scouts from Washington, Oregon and Idaho here. Our trip by mule will be 26 miles, which will include an overnight stop."

Weber, representing the Modoc area council as one of a north-west group making the tour of southwestern states and spending a month at the Scout ranch, left Klamath Falls July 5 and visited Los Angeles, Palm Springs, Hollywood, Blythe, El Paso, Juarez, Old Mexico and Carlsbad Caverns and Roswell, N. M., from where the Scouts were taken to the ranch.

One comment made by Weber was that the trip to Juarez across the international bridge was "very costly" due to tactics employed by Mexican merchants on that side of the line.

Weber stated that he has learned to pack mules, has had several days of hiking conditioning, and will be out 20 days on various pack trips.
