

Bend Gridiron Sees 13-7 Tilt

If the Brooklyn Dodgers were playing to get their names added to contracts last night, there are several of the boys who don't have to worry about jobs any more. Last night at Bend the White Dodgers defeated the Black Dodgers by 13-7 on Bruin field.

Those who can count themselves in include Glenn Dobbs, Mickey Mayne and Bob Paffrath in the backfield, Ends Jim McCarthy and Bob McCain and Center Russ Morrow. They were dickouts of the squad game.

The Black team, built around Mickey Mayne as tailback, scored first in the opening quarter. Mayne advanced the ball from his own 20 down to the White 20 on line plays and a completed pass, then flipped a 20-yard pass to McCain in the end zone for the touchdown.

Fullback Chuck Timmons placekicked the extra point, making the score 7-0.

Owen Given Little Hope

CLACK, Aug. 10 (AP)—Certainly, if the American organized baseball this season, "reputable" Mickey Owen still was optimistic today he would escape the official five-year suspension placed against him when he joined to Mexico.

The former Brooklyn catcher, after a conference in Baseball Commissioner A. B. Chandler's office, said he had received "neither encouragement nor discouragement" and that he still had "hope that I can be reinstated."

Owen was told, however, by Harold (Muddy) Ruel, Chandler's special assistant, and Walter Mulberry, the commissioner's secretary, that baseball laws prohibit reinstatement of an ineligible player between August 1 and October 31.

Owen quit Mexican baseball last week because of "an accumulation of disgust." At Mexico City, Mexican League President Jorge Pasquel said "the baseball war is on again" as a result of Owen's desertion of the Mexican loop.

Ward Still Undefeated

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 10 (AP)—A chunky, confident former electrician's mate in the navy, who doctors once said never would play golf again, because of a broken hand, today had what he had been seeking since his discharge, a formal tournament golf match with Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio.

Both Stranahan and Smiley Quick of Inglewood, Calif., the man who wouldn't take the doctor's word as final, won their upper bracket, quarter final matches yesterday by small margins in the western amateur tournament. They faced each other today for the right to enter the finals Sunday.

In the lower bracket Marvin "Bud" Ward of Spokane took on George Victor of Chicago for the same privilege. Ward coasted to a 6 and 5 victory over William Campbell of Huntington, W. Va., yesterday.

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Brooks Can Cop Season

Dodgers Unbeaten By Phillies This Year

Never in the history of major league baseball has one team swept an entire season's series from another, but today the National League leading Brooklyn Dodgers are halfway towards accomplishing this unprecedented feat.

In 11 skirmishes with the seventh place Philadelphia Phils, the Flatbush team has yet to lose. They gained their 11th straight last night in Philadelphia by the narrowest of margins, 1-0.

Last night's triumph enabled the pace-setters to maintain their two-game margin over the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals who took the measure of the Reds 3-2 in Cincinnati.

The Cards and Reds met under the lights as did all the other big league clubs making it the first time in history a full schedule was played under the lamps.

Shutout for Higbe
Kirby Higbe turned in the Brooklyn shutout, getting the nod over Oscar Judd when Pete Reiser singled home Pee Wee Reese in the eighth inning after the latter had doubled.

Whitey Kurowski paced a 16-hit St. Louis attack with a home run, double and two singles and drove in three mates to help Howie Pollet notch his 13th victory of the season, tops for senior circuit hurlers. Joe Garagiola, rookie Card catcher, also homered, his first in the big leagues.

The American league leading Boston Red Sox increased their margin over the New York Yankees to 14 games—their largest of the season—when they edged out the Bronxites 4-3 at the Yankee stadium. Rudy York, hit a homer with two mates aboard.

The Tigers, paced by Outfielder Dick Wakefield, who got five for five including a home run, moved to within a game of second place by shanding the Chicago White Sox 5-4.

Sixth Defeat
Washington's Senators handed the Philadelphia Athletics their sixth loss in a row as Southpaw Mickey Haefner outdueled Lum Harris 2-1 for his 10th victory. The Cleveland Indians exploded for five runs in the sixth on five consecutive hits and three walks to beat the St. Louis Browns 5-4.

Even Frank E. McKinney, new Pittsburgh Pirates' president, couldn't bring luck to his Bucs as they were trampled by the Cubs 9-3 at Forbes field.

The Boston Braves boosted its season's mark to an even 500 with a 5-1 record as Warren Spahn held the New York Giants to seven hits to give the Braves a 5-3 victory at Boston. It was Boston's eighth win in its last 11 games.

Special Tags To Be Drawn

To get permits to take part in any of the seven controlled deer and elk shoots outside the regular seasons in Oregon this fall it will be necessary for hunters to write a letter to the Oregon state game commission in Portland, putting in a bid.

First, the applicant must have a state hunting license. Send the number of the license, your name and address, information as to which special season you wish to hunt in, and five dollars for your permit.

In case there are more applications for the permits than there are tags to be issued, a drawing will be held for each special season on August 21. The persons who are drawn for permits to hunt will be sent their tags, and the losers will be sent their money back.

According to state police here, there seems to be nothing against a person taking part in more than one hunt if he puts in bids for more than one tag and sends in the required amount of money.

Also these game seasons are over and above the regular season and the regular limit of one buck.

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Jansen Gets Number 23

Seal Hurler Bidding To Crack Loop Mark

Larry Jansen, 26-year-old Oregon farm boy transplanted to the mound, today had 23 victories for the San Francisco Seals in his bid to crack the modern pitching record of the Pacific Coast Baseball league.

His season hurling average of .885 in 26 games, with only three losses, is above the percentages of all the pitchers who wound up with the most games won since the league first played as an "outlaw" loop in 1903.

Already Jansen has equalled or passed the leading war-time pitchers in games won, with the exception of Bob Joyce's 31-game record last year, and the 1946 league leader, it is a more than a fourth of the distance to Joyce's mark topped the field since 1922.

The imperturbable Jansen, marked by some of his opponents as a man with ice water in his veins, shut out the Seattle Rainiers 4-0 last night. He allowed five hits in his third shutout and his 12th consecutive win.

The Seals backed their pitching ace with a three-run drive in the first inning, when Hugh Luby tripled, Vince DiMaggio singled him home, Ferris Fain walked, and Don White doubled in two counts. Fain and Manager Jo Jo White of the Rainiers were bounced from the game after a sixth-inning tiff at first base.

Francis Shea of the second-place Oakland Aacorns fireballed a two-hit blanking of the San Diego Padres, 8 to 0. It was his 11th victory against four defeats, and it maintained the challenging Aacorns' position three games behind the leading Seals.

Sacramento's rampaging Solons, coming back from their first setback Thursday in 10 games, last night downed the Los Angeles Angels 4-3. Garth (Red) Mann delivered seven-hit ball in his ninth win for the Solons. The victory left fourth-place Sacramento four and a half games behind the third-ranking Angels.

The Hollywood Stars, in their second straight triumph since former Chicago White Sox Manager Jimmy Dykes took over the helm, nosed out the Portland Beavers 4-3. A four-hit attack rang up three tallies, the last two scoring on Tom O'Brien's double, in Hollywood's big eighth inning.
