Resort To Run Plane Service

The first established plane service to be operated by a vacation resort in northern California will get under way next week when a five-place Navion airplane is delivered to the Trinity Alps resort near Weaverville.

Sharp Drop Recorded In Portland Cargoes

PORTLAND, Aug. 12 (AP)—Portland and lower Columbia river ports shipped \$89,837,601 worth of cargo during the last seven months, just 17 per cent of the value of shipments during the same period in 1945.

Tonnage was 919,656 short tons, much of it lumber, paper, coal, and grain. Shipments went

to 21 nations, with Russia the principal customer. She received \$34,591,272 worth of goods, about 10 per cent the value of goods she took in the seven months of the preceding wartime year.
