

Government Announces Homestead Requisites For Tulalake Project

Editor's note: Following is the official press release from the bureau of reclamation on the Tulalake homestead opening.

Following announcement by Secretary of the Interior Krug in Washington of public lands being opened to World War II veterans in the Tulalake division, Klamath project, public notice No. 43 was posted today in the post office at Klamath Falls, setting forth qualifications for entrymen and explaining the method of selection to be followed in awarding the lands.

Simultaneously, copies of the public notice and application forms are being mailed to all veterans who have asked to receive it. Veterans interested in the lands who have not yet given notice of their interest should write immediately to superintendent, bureau of reclamation, Klamath Falls, Ore., or to regional director, bureau of reclamation, Sacramento, Calif.

All applications returned to Klamath Falls by 2 p. m. September 13 will be considered as having been filed simultaneously. In view of the large number of these applications expected, it is highly doubtful if any lands will be left for the consideration of applications received after this date.

The lands themselves comprise 7527 acres of highly productive and valuable irrigated land divided into 86 units. The units vary in size from 60.8 acres to 141.3 acres, the most valuable land in the smaller units. Average size of the 86 units is 87.5 acres.

The Tulalake lands are the first public lands for farming to be opened to veterans of World War II in the United States. This fact, coupled with the high value of the crops produced on the land, accounts for the very large number of applicants, expected to exceed 15,000.

Minimum qualifications for veterans who wish to apply are outlined in public notice No. 43 as follows:

Age: No minimum age is set, but the man must have served in the armed forces of the United States at least 90 days, and must have received an honorable discharge.

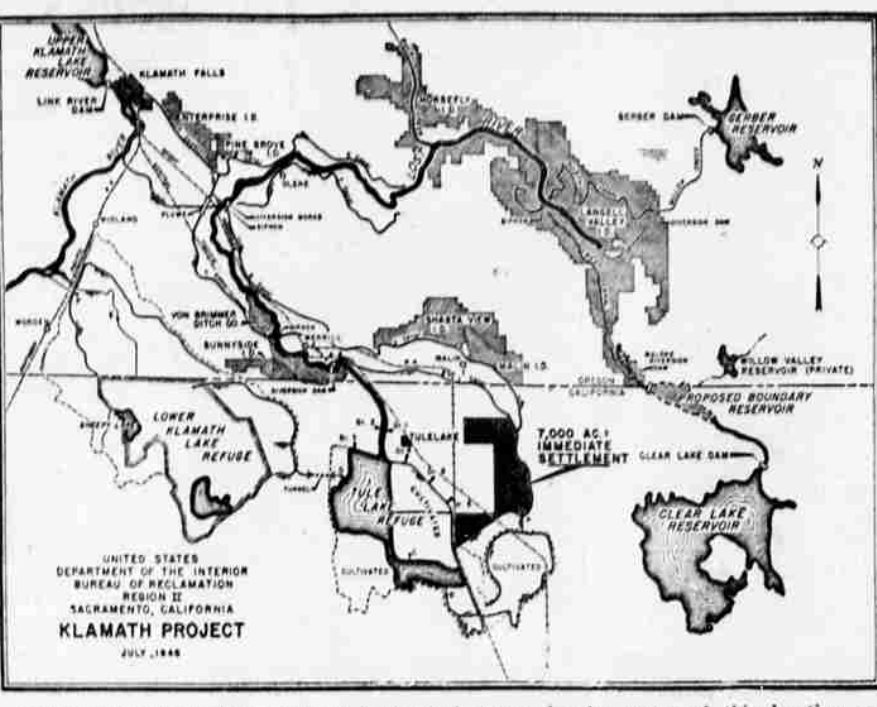

Rich Klamath Land To Be Opened To GI Settlers



High land for the lucky is enclosed in the dark sector in the center of this location map, showing the 7527 acres to be awarded to veterans of World War II this year by the United States, through the Reclamation Bureau of the Department of the Interior, on the Klamath Project land of the bureau near the Oregon-California border. The 86 farm units to be awarded this year comprise rich irrigated land at an elevation of 4100 feet—offering the kind of self-sufficient outdoor life dreamed of by GIs from the shores of China to the banks of the Elbe. These are the first public farm lands to be offered to World War II veterans. Application forms are now being mailed to interested veterans.

Chiloquin Girl Hurt By Train

Unconscious and critically injured, Mrs. Florence Hicks of Chiloquin, a 19-year-old Indian girl, is in Klamath Valley hospital following an attempt to beat a train across a railroad crossing at Chiloquin early this morning.

The young woman was driving a 1934 Ford on route to the home of her father, Benjamin Jones of Chiloquin. As she approached the crossing near the Chiloquin Lumber company about a quarter of a mile this side of the Chiloquin station, she apparently tried to get across the track in the path of the southbound Southern Pacific passenger train which was also nearing the crossing.

According to the accident report of SP Engineer A. Denison and Conductor M. F. Thompson, the train was just picking up speed after slowing to 25 miles per hour at the main crossing. Trainmen saw the Hicks car too late to stop. They set the time of the accident at 7:50 a. m.

Mrs. Hicks was brought to Klamath Agency for emergency treatment and then to Klamath Valley hospital by Merchants Police ambulance.

Attendants at the Agency believe she is suffering from a brain concussion, probable skull fracture and cuts and bruises. Early this afternoon she was still unconscious.

Her husband, James Hicks, is believed to be employed at Mowich.
