## Jos. Pelland Dies After Auto Wreck

Joseph Pelland, 53, of 4510 Boardman, died at 5:45 this morning at Hillside hospital as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident early Monday morning a few miles north of Merrill on highway 39. Mrs. Pelland, in the car with her husband, was only slightly injured, and Raymond A. Porterfield of Dorris, named by Mrs. Pelland as driver of the second car involved, was unhurt.

State police who investigated say that the Pelland car appeared to have been parked along the highway when it was struck by the Porterfield automobile, although definite details are not known.

Pelland was brought unconscious to Klamath Valley hospital where he was said to be suffering from a fractured skull, broken ribs and severe internal injuries. He was removed to Hillside hospital for surgery last night.

Pelland has lived here off and on since 1934. He was a native of Spaulding, Mich., and is survived by his wife, May, of this city, two daughters, three brothers and four sisters. Funeral arrangements are under the direction of the Earl Whitlock funeral home.

## Ford To Sell Special Cars For Disabled Veteran Use

Disabled veterans can once more take to the open road through the courtesy of the Ford Motor company. A new car, especially equipped for use by the veteran who has lost an arm or leg is now on the market, and is sold at no additional cost.

Available to veterans of World War II only, the car is designed with an automatic clutch, hand throttle and brake, and hand operated controls of all kinds so that it may be driven by a man who has lost either arms or legs.

A demonstrator model is now at Balsiger's, brought to Klamath Falls by Mr. Turner, Ford service department, from Richmond, Calif. The car is equipped with a lever on the left side of the wheel, opposite the gear shift lever, that operates both throttle and brakes. Pull down on the lever and you open the throttle, push up on it and you apply brakes.

The clutch is automatic, working on a vacuum principle. Whenever power is taken off the clutch automatically disengages, thus precluding any possibility of a stall when the brakes are applied.

Other items on the car include steering wheel grip, electric direction signal, hand operated dimmer and hand throttle. A switch on the dash is thrown to put the automatic clutch in operation. When the switch is off the car drives and handles like an ordinary one. When in automatic position the car can be driven with no more trouble than the average driver encounters in his standard car.

This special attachment may also be secured for any Ford or Mercury car from 1940 on up, and will be installed for the veteran free of charge by the Ford company.
