

Truman Pens Signature On 5-Year Hospital Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—Legislation setting up a \$1,125,000,000 five-year hospital construction program was signed today by President Truman.

Mr. Truman said the measure, which authorizes federal assistance to states and local governments in building hospitals, lays a groundwork for providing more and better medical care for the people of our country.

The legislation authorizes the federal government to pay one-third of the cost of building or equipping new hospitals, the government's share of the aggregate planned cost to be \$375,000,000 and the sponsors the remaining \$750,000,000.

Sponsors may be state, city or other public governmental agencies or private non-profit hospitals.

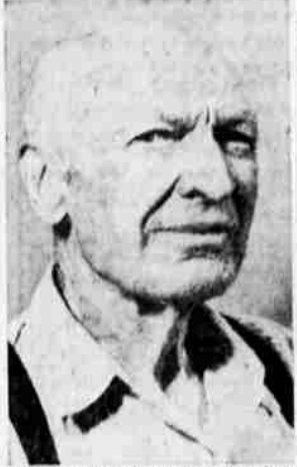
States will share in the fund on the basis of their needs, which will be ascertained through the ratio their per capita income bears to the national average. Other factors bearing on the determination of need will be population and value of products.

Mr. Truman said the construction of hospitals and related facilities was the first item in a five-point health program he advocated in a message to congress last November.

He signed the bill, despite certain provisions "which I consider objectionable."

He said a provision setting up a council composed of individuals who are not full time government officials and giving

Big Apple Crop Seen For Washington State

SEATTLE, Aug. 13 (AP)—Washington's prospective apple crop is 30,972,000 bushels topping the entire nation, state and federal agricultural statisticians reported today, having raised their July 1 estimate of 29,904,000 bushels. Last year's Washington apple harvest totalled 26,900,000 bushels. Oregon expects a 3,315,000 bushel crop against last year's 2,882,000 bushels.

Virginia appears to be in second place this season, with an estimated 13,140,000 bushels compared with New York's 12,900,000 bushel prospective crop. Last year California was second to Washington with 10,568,000 bushels. Its current estimate is for a 7,452,000 crop.

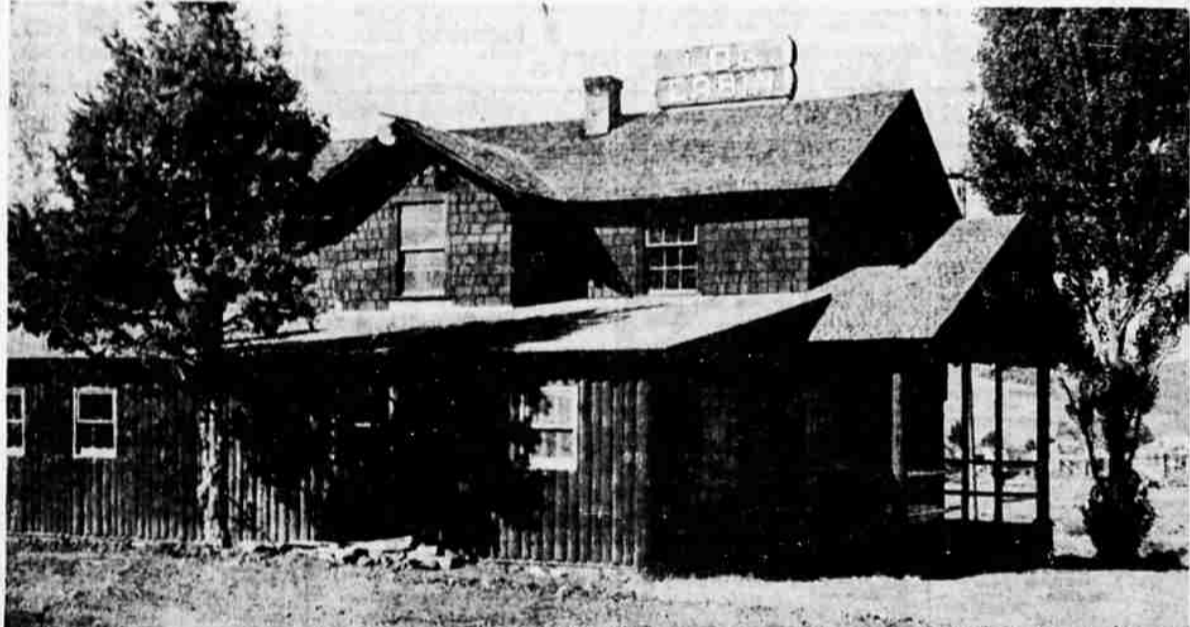
