

Relief Tossing Saves Dodgers

There is no mystery about what's keeping the Brooklyn Dodgers at the head of the National league—it is their bullpen hurlers.

This becomes more apparent day by day. Of the club's 110 games this season, the relief corps has come to the starting pitcher's rescue 74 times and has emerged with 25 victories against only 10 defeats besides "saving" 13 other games. The brilliant work done by the Dodger relief corps is best illustrated by the won and lost record of Hugh Casey, whose 10 victories, all gained in relief roles, is second only to Starter Vic Lombardi's 11 triumphs.

Brooklyn starting pitchers, who have completed only 36 games, or less than one-third of their starts, needed help only once in yesterday's 8-4 and 2-1 victories over the New York Giants. The two triumphs increased the league-leaders' margin over the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals to one and a half games. The Cards won their game from the Cubs 6-4 in Chicago.

Hank Behrman represented the bullpen brigade with a scoreless four and two-thirds inning mount stint to receive credit for his eighth victory in the first game, his third in a relief assignment. Southpaw Joe Hatten needed no assistance in winning the night contest, the second half of an unprecedented afternoon-night doubleheader, the first of its kind in the major leagues.

Record Boosted
With separate admission prices charged for each game, a total of 57,224 cash customers turned out at Ebbets' field to boost the Brooklyn home attendance to a record 1,238,161. The former mark of 1,214,910 was made in 1941, the last time the Dodgers won a pennant.

The Boston Red Sox continued their pennant parade with a 3-1 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics, their 13th victory in 15 games with the American league cellar-dwellers.

Floyd Bevens, Giant New York right-hander, also notched his 13th victory when he pitched the Yankees to a 4-1 triumph over the Washington Senators under the lights at the Yankee stadium. Bevens scattered five hits in outpitching Dutch Leonard. Aaron Robinson hit his 14th home run in the second, the 100th Yankee homer this season.

Tigers Go Down
Manager Lou Boudreau rapped out four hits including two doubles, his second two-bagger, helped by an outfield error, bringing in Heinz Becker from first with the run that gave the Cleveland Indians a 12-inning 6-5 victory over the Detroit Tigers. Red Embree limited the Tigers to two hits in four innings of relief hurling to gain credit for his seventh triumph.

The Boston Braves went over the 500 mark for the first time since May 25 when Mort Cooper pitched them to a 5-4 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies in a home night contest. The victory went to the Braves, however, as Cooper sprained his pitching elbow and left ankle when he fell after scoring the Tribesmen's final run in the six-inning game.

Nick Stancevich pitched the Pittsburgh Pirates to their fifth straight victory and only a game and a half out of seventh place as the Bucs shaded the Cincinnati Reds 3-2.

Portland Nine Duels To Draw
GREAT FALLS, Mont., Aug. 15 (P)—Portland, Ore., and Los Angeles, halted at a 2-2 tie in the ninth inning last night because of darkness, meet again for the playoff today in regional American Legion Baseball tournament competition.

The San Francisco Seals and the Oakland Acons both worked extra innings last night to win their Pacific Coast Baseball league games and maintain unchanged status in their private fight for league championship.

The Seals backed up a 10-inning 6-5 victory over the Portland Beavers when burly Bruce Ogdowski, Seal catcher, drove in the winning run with a single after two were out in the last of the tenth. It was Ogdowski's third hit of the game.

Col. Bradley Dead At 86

Sportsman Had Owned Four Derby Winners

LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 15 (P)—Col. E. R. Bradley, 86-year-old sportsman whose horses have won four Kentucky derbies, died of a heart attack at his Idle Hour farm at Lexington at 1 a. m. this morning.

Col. Bradley for several years spent his winters in Florida and his summers in New York and Maryland. He stopped off here once or twice a year and nearly always spent part of the Thanksgiving season at his Idle Hour farm.

He annually donated several thousand dollars for use in preparing special meals and presents at Thanksgiving time for inmates of many public and private children's homes throughout Kentucky.

Although he never witnessed a Kentucky derby after 1937 because of his health, he listened to radio broadcasts of the races with close friends.

His derby winners included Behave Yourself in 1921, Bubbling Over in 1926, Burgoon King in 1932 and Broker's Tip in 1933. His entries ran one-two in the Kentucky derbies of 1921 and 1928.

His last effort to win the derby for a fifth time was made in 1945 with Burning Diamond, which finished ninth. Bimelich, another Bradley hopeful, finished second in the 1940 derby.

Col. Bradley built his fortune on successful real estate operations and wise investments, including the elaborate Casino at Palm Beach, Fla., which he disposed of a year or so ago.

He was born at Johnston, Pa., on December 12, 1859.

Folks Will Flock Into Grid Games

CHICAGO, Aug. 15 (P)—College football is bustling towards its greatest attendance season in history with advance ticket sales ranging from 25 to an astronomical 800 per cent ahead of last year, an Associated Press survey indicated today.

At least a half dozen schools—Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Southern California, UCLA and University of California—will play before a half million or more fans, while other institutions will be restricted to smaller crowds only because their playing bowls are made of concrete instead of rubber.

Typical of a growing ticket dilemma is the threat by Georgia Tech students to commandeer the playing field at the November 3 sellout between Navy and Tech at Atlanta unless undergraduates get a seating break.

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Owen Must Wait Five Years

CINCINNATI, Aug. 15 (P)—Mickey Owen's jaunt south of the border threatened today to end his ten-year baseball career. Baseball Commissioner A. B. Chandler last night refused to lift the five-year suspension imposed on the former Brooklyn catcher and all other American contracts to take fat jobs with the Mexican league.

Owen insisted, nevertheless, that he would not go south again, and since he will be 35 and past his prime when the suspension ends, it looks like Mickey is through.

But Mickey refused to give up hope. Conceding that he was "set" financially as a result of his Mexican adventure, he said he hoped the whole thing would blow over soon, or that Brooklyn would find some loophole to get him back. Meantime, he said he'd work on his Springfield, Mo., farm.

STELLAR HALFBACK RETURNS TO HUSKIES
LONGVIEW, Aug. 15 (P)—Coach Pest Welch of the University of Washington here for the Brooklyn Dodgers intrasquad game, told interviewers that Sam Robinson, ace university halfback, definitely will be out for football this year.

Robinson's studies will not keep him from participating, Welch said.

Welch Also Rates Troy
SPOKANE, Aug. 15 (P)—The University of Washington's Coach Pest Welch (Pest) Welch joins the list of coaches who monotonously predict that the University of Southern California and UCLA will fight it out this fall for a tree pass to the Rose Bowl, with USC coming out on top.

Responding to a survey of Pacific Coast conference coaches, Welch says both Southern Cal and the Bruins have enough material for two or three teams of conference caliber. That sustained power, he adds, will overwhelm schools that may have good starting lineups.

The Huskies' coach says this about Washington State: "WSC has been building for this season for quite a while and definitely has to be figured high up on the PCC ladder."

He picks the Oregon State squad for fourth place but says it might finish a notch or two higher.

Leaving out his own school, Welch says the teams will rank in this order at the finish: Southern California, UCLA, Washington State, Oregon State, California, Stanford, Oregon, Montana and Idaho.
