

Farm Bureaus To Argue Against Rate Increases

WALLA WALLA, Aug. 15 (AP)—R. D. Flaherty, secretary of the Washington state farm bureau and Washington-Idaho Wheat Growers' league, in a statement released here today, announced the case to be presented on behalf of 30,000 Oregon, Washington and Idaho farm families at an interstate commerce commission hearing at Salt Lake City on railroad freight rates.

"We are not opposed to an increase in rates for the railroads," he stated, "if they can prove the necessity. Since the railroads are interested in revenue, it is our contention increases in rates on a number of our heavy volume movement crops will not increase revenue, but actually will decrease it."

The roads have asked a 25 per cent rate boost. They have been

given temporary increases of 6 per cent on general commodities and 3 per cent on most agricultural and raw materials, he added.

The statement said Attorney Don Carl Smith, Seattle, will present the case for the Washington and Oregon state farm bureaus, the Washington-Idaho Wheat Growers' league and the Eastern Oregon Wheat League, and that a joint committee will make the decisions for the organizations. It comprises R. B. Taylor, Adams, Ore.; Marion Weatherford, Arlington, Ore.; Walter Johnson, Hatton, Wash., and Flaherty.

Case in Brief

In brief, this is their case: "Agricultural producers of this area must ship their products to market, farther than any other area."

"The percentage method of increasing rates is unsound, as it places a greater unit increase on areas farthest from markets and throws them out of line competitively with other producing areas."

Illustrating their argument that increased rates will decrease railroads' revenues, they cite potatoes, "where summer varieties have been developed which are now marketed in nearly all 48 states. A 25 per cent increase will give a price advantage to less efficient areas closer to market."

And, the ranch groups add: "Wheat is a case where the rate is now so high that only limited movement can take place under competitive marketing. Very little wheat and flour can move east by rail under present

rates, unless there is a short crop of soft wheat in the Midwest.

"Our crop has to go to the coast by rail and barge; then to the Gulf and Atlantic coast markets by boat, which restricts the area in which we can sell."

"If the railroads would reduce eastbound rates, a big volume would move by rail and their revenues would increase."

"Dry peas have a similar situation, as well as eggs, turkeys, canned and powdered milk, canned and frozen fruit, berries and vegetables."

World Wheat Crops Better

As the season advances the world wheat picture shows material improvement. Excluding the Soviet Union and China, the 1946 crop is expected to be 8 to 10 per cent above that of 1945, and perhaps not far from the 1935-39 average, according to OSC extension service.

In Russia prospects for total grain production are favorable though acreage and yield are not up to prewar.

Canadian crops show material improvement over a year ago while in Australia and Argentina moisture conditions have returned to near normal, and the seeded acreage is equal to or above last year.

U. S. Relaxes Indian Loans

Restrictions in early American Indian legislation which have heretofore caused commercial lenders to refuse applications for GI loans to most Indian veterans of the northwest, even with the veterans administration guarantee of 50 per cent of the loan, are now being eased by the United States government.

New regulations approved by

the office of Indian affairs of the U. S. department of the interior will enable the Indian borrower to furnish securities on a scale comparable to that of any other person, Patrick Kilby, veterans administration representative in Klamath Falls, explained.

Indian superintendents now are authorized to permit the Indian to assign income from trust lands as security for a loan if the lending agency and Indian borrower agree. As further security Indian agents may approve mortgages of trust chattels.

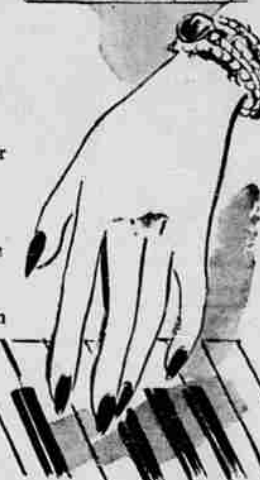
