

Russia, In Surprise Move, Demands Deletion Of The Proposed Arms Count Bill

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 9 (AP)—Russia unexpectedly refused early today to accept a proposal for a United Nations inventory of armed troops at home.

In a surprise move, Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov demanded deletion of a home troop census from a resolution already approved by the powerful 54-member U. N. political committee.

His action, taken at an assembly plenary session at Flushing Meadows park, threatened to reopen the whole question of troop dispositions.

Previously at the committee stage, Molotov had agreed to taking census of both domestic forces and those on foreign soil. Molotov tossed today's verbal bombshell into the assembly a few seconds after Sir Ashley Shawcross of Great Britain asked the world peace-keeping body to establish an international inspection board to verify figures submitted by member nations in the troop inventory.

Meet Recused
Delegates who had come to the session prepared to debate the British plan were so surprised and unprepared for Molotov's action that the plenary session was recessed until tomorrow.

The Soviet action highlighted a five-hour plenary session. Just before midnight the assembly hall, in effect, censured South Africa for racial discrimination of Indians in the Union after rejecting a South African demand that the issue be turned over to the international court of justice for an advisory opinion.

This assembly action was considered significant by many delegates, particularly those who argued that such a decision constituted U. N. interference in purely domestic affairs of a member state.

The resolution recognized in-

dia's contention regarding treatment of Indians in South Africa, declaring that "because of that treatment, friendly relations between the two member states have been impaired, and unless a satisfactory settlement is reached these relations are likely to be further impaired."

The assembly called upon the two countries to try to settle their differences and report back to next year's session.

Ashland Police Find Lost Dog

Two Ashland city policemen received the \$200 reward offered by Dan Liskey, Poe valley rancher, for the return of his missing English setter dog, Liskey said today.

The dog was found in Ashland, and Liskey believes it was stolen from his ranch and taken to the Rogue valley town. He has asked officers here to continue an investigation of the theft.

Liskey offered \$200 reward for return of the missing dog, and \$500 reward for arrest and conviction of the thief.

Doolittle Rites Held In Alturas

ALTURAS, Dec. 9.—Funeral services were held here today for the late justice of the peace of Canby and Alturas townships, Ralph Doolittle, who died Saturday from a heart attack.

The deceased was born in Anderson, Calif., in 1886. He had operated a ranch at Canby until elected justice of the peace in 1944 and to which office he was reelected in the June primaries this year.

Surviving besides the widow are two daughters, Mrs. Leonard Johnson, Mrs. Charles Crowder, and one son, Ralph, all of Alturas.

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December Skies Promise Dazzling Display Of Stars

Should your occupational duties or your sturdiness of will power and interest in the starry skies arouse you from your dreams at "the crack of dawn"—and if the morning sky should luckily be unclouded—a splendid planetary array awaits your gaze during this coming week. This display will be at its best on December 10, but will be fine for a week or more.

On that date the brightest of the planets, Venus and Jupiter, will be little more than one degree apart, low in the southeastern region of the sky, having risen considerably more than two hours before the sun. Then for good measure, Mercury, the little world not often seen, will be found somewhat lower and farther east than the closely grouped pair. Venus will appear the most brilliant by far, followed in order by Jupiter and

Low and a little south of east, the large figure of Orion appears. Three stars in a short vertical line constitute his belt. Red Betelgeuse to the left of the belt, and white Rigel to the right are very bright. Considerably above Orion orange Aldebaran twinkles in the Hyades. Still higher the tiny, cloudlike dipper of the Pleiades immediately attracts attention.

Rather low in the west Altair is shining. Well up and toward the northwest we find brilliant Vega, the brightest star in the western half of the sky. Considerably higher than this, Deneb stands at the top of the Northern Cross.

Puget Sound Port Tie-Up Ends Today

SEATTLE, Dec. 9 (AP)—Sixty-nine days of idleness on Puget Sound's waterfront was to come to an end today as a result of ratification of a new contract agreement by the AFL Checkers' association.

Details of the agreement, approved overwhelmingly by union members, were not divulged pending actual signature of the pact today by the Washington Waterfront Employers' association, the checkers and the AFL International Longshoremen's association.

Pape Crummer, checker business agent, said the docks would be manned immediately after the signing with priority being given to Alaska vessels. Seventy-five ships have been idle throughout the lengthy waterfront tie-up.

Settlement of the checkers' dispute was reached Saturday with withdrawal of an employer demand for sole right to decide on hiring of supercarries.

Crummer and Merle G. Ringenberg, president of the employers' association, said a new clause providing for appointment of a joint committee to handle disagreements over hiring and other matters had been inserted in the new contract.

Charter Meet Held In Yreka

TULELAKE, Dec. 9.—Preliminary steps toward drafting a charter form of government for Siskiyou county were taken at a meeting on December 2 of the county board of freeholders at Yreka.

A committee was appointed to ask the county board of supervisors to provide funds to cover such expenses as may be incurred, according to Earl Ager, Tulelake representative.

Dr. C. C. Dickinson of McCloud was elected chairman of the freeholders, with Joseph Corrae of Etna, vice chairman and Russell H. Bradshaw, secretary.

The board has 120 days to prepare the charter which will be presented to the people in a special election.

Youth Caught On Second Burglary

PORTLAND, Dec. 9 (AP)—A return to the scene of a previous theft proved the undoing yesterday of a 16-year-old boy who police said couldn't resist again trying to rob a house where he earlier had obtained \$800 to finance a spending spree in Portland and Seattle.

Police said the youth was caught by Cleto M. Lavegetto as the boy tried to enter the home by the same window he had used in the earlier theft.
