

Muddy Walks Called To Attention Of City Council

A 41-signature petition from citizens living along 11th between Klamath and Walnut was received by the city council Monday night, calling attention to the condition of the sidewalk near the Cascade apartments. The petition asked the city to do something about the mud and water on the walk during every small rain, and declared it a nuisance and eyesore. The council referred the matter to the city engineer.

Chamber of commerce directors and the manager will have to stop parking their cars in the space in front of the chamber, reserved for visiting tourists. The council received a request from the chamber asking that the space be left free of parking meters for the convenience of tourists. The council agreed to comply with the request if the chamber would see that the space was used by no one else but tourists. Mayor Ed Oetendorf was heard to mention that he would now have to look for another place to park.

A request was received from George W. Hillis of the Oregon Equipment company asking that a loading zone be placed at the building as the alley could not be used for the size of the merchandise which was necessary to take into the showroom. The matter was referred to the traffic safety committee for a report.

A communication from Fire Chief Keith Ambrose stated that 73 boilers had been located in the city. Twenty-five of the boilers had been inspected in the last year, 21 had been inspected over one year since the last inspection, 24 had no inspection certificate, and three are not in use at the time. In regard to the 24 boilers with no certificate the council observed that the state boiler inspector was "a little lax in his job" as all boilers are supposed by state law to be inspected at least once a year. The attached list of the 73 boilers was sent to the state inspector.

The fire chief asked the council to request permission of the telephone company and the

power company to string a cable between their two poles diagonally across the intersection of Broad and Main. The cable will be used to hold a blinker light for traffic safety during fire calls. The permission was granted.

Councilman Harvey Martin called attention of the council to the intersection of Eberlein and Washburn way, stating that a stop light should be established at the junction for the purpose of traffic control. The request was referred to the traffic safety committee for a report.

Police Chief Orville Hamilton told the council that the city sanitation officer should be sent out to make a thorough check of the new annexation on S. 6th, and inform residents that they must obey the city's sanitation code.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas asked the city for permission to construct two-by-four foot concrete walkways to the parking meters wherever they are set in ground not covered by sidewalks. He pointed out that not only would the walk be of service to the public, but would also serve to anchor the meter posts more securely. The council decided that such installation could be paid for from the meter fund and granted the permission.

Three new ordinances were introduced and passed for a second reading. The first provided for the new recreation committee and its method of appointment. The second brought several sections of land along Alameda into a class one residential zone from a class two zone. Third ordinance provided for the placing of the new annexation in ward 3, precinct 33, and provided the various zonings for the area.

Six liquor inspection permits and nine meat dealers licenses were granted by the council.
