

Details Worked Out For New Memorial Cemetery

The committee working out details of operating the new Memorial cemetery has decided that concrete boxes will be used in the bottom of all graves in the place of wooden casket coverings, to facilitate perpetual care work at the cemetery. Also the committee has decided that no headstones raised above the level of the ground will be allowed.

Wooden boxes used in many cemeteries rot in a few months and cause the ground to settle, thereby making it necessary to fill in and re-sod several times before a grave is in permanent condition.

The city will furnish the boxes.

Grave markers to be used will be bronze plates set in concrete and installed at ground level, so that mowers can pass over the markers.

These regulations are in line with the best practices of well-kept cemeteries in other cities, the committee explains.

Individual graves in Memorial cemetery are priced at from \$25 to \$125, and family lots containing six gravesites can be purchased. Persons who already have lots in Linkville cemetery may turn in those sites on lots in Memorial cemetery and receive a \$5 reduction in the new purchase price.

Graves in Linkville cemetery may be moved to Memorial cemetery by the city's caretaking and grave digging crew for the price of opening and closing the old and new graves.

Twenty-five per cent of all the money taken in on lot purchases will be set aside in a trust fund by the city, the interest to be used in the perpetual care of the cemetery. The city expects to increase the percentage going in to the fund as more money is needed for the care.

Memorial cemetery includes 90 acres on the Cumberland road, including 25 acres on the west side of the road which have been improved with paved streets and curbs and six acres sown to grass and ready for burials.

Lower Court Action Delayed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough today approved an agreement between government and John L. Lewis attorneys to delay until late January any further lower court action against the United Mine Workers growing out of the recent coal strike.

The joint stipulation approved by Judge Goldsborough provides that any further litigation be deferred until ten days after the supreme court hears arguments on the appeal of Lewis and the miners from their contempt convictions in Goldsborough's court.

The appeal is due to be argued January 14.

Hinging on the appeal are fines of \$10,000 on the UMW president and \$3,500,000 on the union.

Lawyers were of the opinion that the supreme court will require no more than two weeks to conclude the case there.

Land Mine Explodes On China Airfield

TIENSIN, Dec. 11 (AP)—The newspaper Ta Kung Pao reported today a U. S. marine caterpillar tractor hit a Japanese war-laid mine at Tsingtao airfield Tuesday and the unidentified marine driver and the machine were blown up. The airfield was damaged, preventing landing of a Chinese National Airways plane.

New Egyptian Cabinet Set Up

CAIRO, Dec. 11 (AP)—Mahmoud Fahmy Nokrachi Pasha, named premier for the second time within 10 months, set up a new Egyptian cabinet Tuesday in the midst of renegotiations of a treaty touching on British, Egyptian and Sudanese interests.

The new premier, a 58-year-old one-time school teacher, was appointed by young King Farouk I yesterday to succeed ailing politically independent Ismail Sidky Pasha who resigned the post Sunday amid differences with the British over a new treaty to replace the 1936 Anglo-Egyptian alliance.

CPA Called "Capricious"

PORTLAND, Dec. 11 (AP)—The civilian production administration was accused of unreasonable and capricious conduct yesterday by an attorney in federal court.

R. B. Kester, representing Will H. Jones, Rogue River, in an injunction suit, declared the conduct was defeating the CPA's purpose—to speed housing construction.

He contended the motel which the CPA stopped Jones from completing was the kind of housing needed in the Grants Pass area until permanent homes can be built.

The government charged Jones with continuing construction without a permit. A temporary injunction was obtained to stop him earlier. The CPA now seeks to have the injunction made permanent.

Disgusted Miner Reenlists In Army

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 11 (AP)—Woodrow Slusher, 31-year-old Lynch, Ky., coal miner and war veteran, reenlisted in the armed forces here Tuesday because the army "never goes on a strike."

Slusher, who spent three years with the army in the Pacific and European areas with a paratroop unit, had been employed as a miner since his discharge.

"There was pretty good money in it," Slusher said, referring to his coal mining job, "but the strikes cut down the total too much. We've been on strike three times during the year and a half I've been out of the army."

"Every time I got a biscuit on the table somebody snatched it away."

Slusher entered the army with the rank of sergeant.

British Rescue Stranded Jews

JERUSALEM, Dec. 11 (AP)—The British navy announced today that 742 shipwrecked Jewish refugees had been evacuated from the lonely

Syria by two British warships and now are en route to Suda bay at Crete, where the immigrants are to be transferred to a hospital ship and thence to Cyprus.

The announcement said the rescue was carried out "in extremely rough seas and in extreme difficulty."

Proposed Fish Bill Rapped At Meeting

PORTLAND, Dec. 11 (AP)—A proposed bill which would increase the state fish commission's authority was criticized by both sports and commercial fishermen at a public hearing Monday.

The spokesman for a sports fishermen's group said the proposal would be studied to determine whether it did not threaten protective legislation now in effect. Commercial fishermen argued for liberalized regulations, particularly along the Columbia river.
