

Tax Program Will Face Opposition

SALEM, Dec. 11 (AP)—Battle lines already were being drawn today over yesterday's report of the state tax study commission, which recommended to the legislature a far-reaching 26-point tax program to raise an additional \$19,500,000 a year.

The proposed increased taxes on business already drew some complaints from business, while road groups complained about giving increased funds to cities. "There will be an awful fight over this program in the legislature," one high state official said. "Most people will agree that the program as a whole is good, but each recommendation will have the opposition of at least one group."

Governor Earl Snell, in making his opening message to the legislature, probably will accept most of the recommendations as part of his tax program. But he is expected to ignore some of them, too.

The tax study commission, which has worked almost two years, pointed out today that its program is designed primarily to aid all governments, rather than just to help the state government.

Of the \$19,500,000 the new taxes would raise, \$11,000,000 would go to counties and cities, with the state getting \$7,500,000. This would leave \$1,000,000 left over.

The commission claimed its program would make Oregon more attractive to industries.

The proposal to boost individual income taxes by lowering exemptions is expected to be opposed by citizens' groups.

Smuggling Chinese Now Big Business

MANILA, Dec. 11 (AP)—Smuggling Chinese into the Philippines is becoming big business. Eighty-one were arrested today in a hideout in the rugged foothills near Laoag and held for deportation. They constituted the fifth such group picked up recently.

One detainee told Filipino officials a recruiter in Amoy charged \$500 each to smuggle Chinese into the Philippines, which they regard as the promised land. Today's 81 would have netted the smuggling ring \$40,500.

Boeing Has Huge Backlog

SEATTLE, Dec. 11 (AP)—William M. Allen, Boeing Aircraft Co. president, estimated today the firm had a backlog of approximately \$200,000,000 in orders.

The latest order disclosed was for 73 additional Boeing B-50 Superfortresses by the army air forces. The B-50 is an improved version of the B-29.

Allen said the new order would result in the hiring of an additional 200 workers and bring total employment to 12,000 by Christmas.

Hardy Final Rites Held

Funeral services for Walter S. Hardy of Corvallis, 67, were held in that city with interment at Oaklawn Memorial park on Tuesday. Hardy died Saturday.

Hardy lived for some time in Medford, moving to Corvallis in 1914. He was wire chief of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company in that area and held that post until 1945, when he retired. He was a charter member of the Oregon Telephone Pioneers of America and was prominent in civic affairs.

Hatcheries Report Record Chinook Run

PORTLAND, Dec. 11 (AP)—A record collection of fall-run chinook eggs at the Bonneville hatchery was reported today by the state hatchery superintendent.

Irvine French said attendants could not handle the heavy run in the small stream to the hatchery the last few days of the salmon movement.

The hatchery collected 16,700,000 eggs, 2,000,000 more than any previous year. A record take was also made at the Clatskanie ponds with a take of 1,300,000 silver salmon eggs and the fish still running.

He reported the nine brooding ponds near Astoria are nearly completed and will be used in raising 500,000 fingerling salmon a year.
