

U. S. Must Have Firmness, Industry, Righteousness Says World Commentator

Firmness, industriousness and righteousness are the foundations on which the United States must build its strength internally and externally if it is to get along with Russia and avert another war.

So said Robert Kazmayer, widely known commentator on world events, in an enthusiastically received address to the Klamath Falls Knife and Fork club at the Willard hotel last night.

At the outset, Kazmayer presented a sharply cut picture of the devotion of the Russians to the communistic system and its world crusade. He described the terrific straining for production in Russia from first hand observations as a transportation factory worker. He told of the consecration of the individual Russian to the program of "changing the world." He gave a graphic account of the pilgrimage of millions of Russians to the tomb of Lenin, as a demonstration of their faith.

Kazmayer went on to point out that Russia has adopted certain fundamentals that played a major role in the early development of America. "Our forefathers," he said, "built on industry, responsibility and faith. The lesson is clear that we must re-consecrate ourselves to these principles if we believe in democracy and want it to survive."

"There is no time to lose. Given 25 years of peace, without appeasement, we can do it." He indicated that there are two mighty systems in competition in the world, and that which proves the most efficient is going to prevail.

The speaker laid great emphasis on the importance of industry, which means production. What the Russians are doing, he asserted, shows conclusively what we should already know—that we can't get anywhere on the theory that one should work just half as much for twice as much pay.

A highlight of Kazmayer's address was a tribute to the "uncommon man."

"Perhaps we talk too much about glorifying the common man," said the speaker.

"America was built by uncommon men with uncommon ideals who work uncommonly hard for an uncommon reward."

Kazmayer said that many of the features of American life today tend to weaken and undermine the character of the people. He urged more self-discipline, greater individual responsibility. He digressed a moment to assail the character of daytime radio programs, apparently referring to the "soap opera" features, and likewise criticized the blood and thunder radio dramas that pro-

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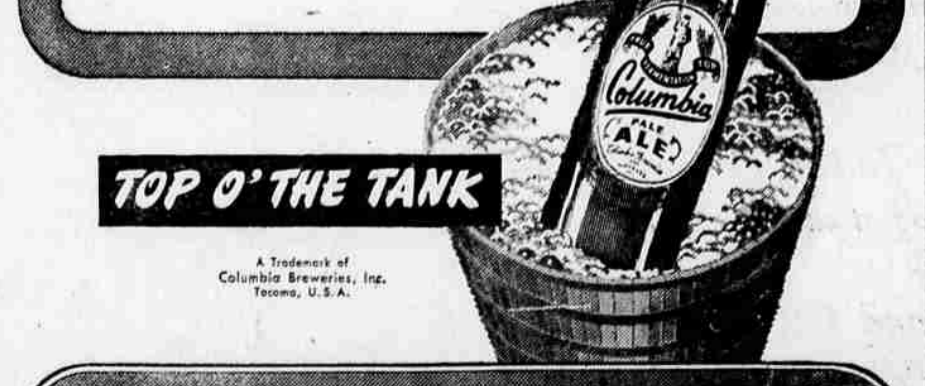
