

New Atomic Committee Selected

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (P)—Appointment of a general advisory committee, headed by President James B. Conant of Harvard university, to advise the atomic energy commission on scientific and technical matters was announced today by President Truman.

Other members of the committee are Lee A. Du Bridge, president of the California Institute of Technology; Enrico Fermi, professor of physics, University of Chicago; J. R. Oppenheimer, wartime director of the Los Alamos laboratories of the Manhattan district; I. I. Rabi, professor of physics, Columbia university; Hartley Rowe, vice president of the United Fruit company; Glenn T. Seaborg, chief radiochemist for the Manhattan district at the University of Chicago; Cyril Stanley Smith, director of the University of Chicago's institute of metals; and Hood Worthington, chemical engineer for Du Pont de Nemours and company.

Mr. Truman said in a news conference statement that the atomic energy commission, headed by David E. Lilienthal, will establish other committees later to advise it on other technical problems.

The group appointed today will concentrate on matters relating to materials, production and research.

Relief Shipment Reduction Asked

LA GRANDE, Dec. 12 (P)—A sharp cut in relief exports to war damaged countries will be asked by Union county delegates at the Eastern Oregon Wheat league meeting opening here Monday.

A resolution, drafted here prior to the three-day conference, proposes that only surplus foods beyond domestic needs be shipped abroad for relief.

PORTLAND, Dec. 12 (P)—Sale of beer in Oregon drug stores will be halted next year and some grocery stores and service stations will lose their present on-the-premises sales licenses.

The Oregon liquor control commission said the policy would be to ban such sales where children congregate.

The only exemptions would be grocery stores which are the only available places in the community for such sales. Service stations will be limited to package sales for off-the-premises drinking.
