WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—The veterans administration today announced a new system to enable schools and colleges to speed up the collection of tuition and fees for veteran-students.

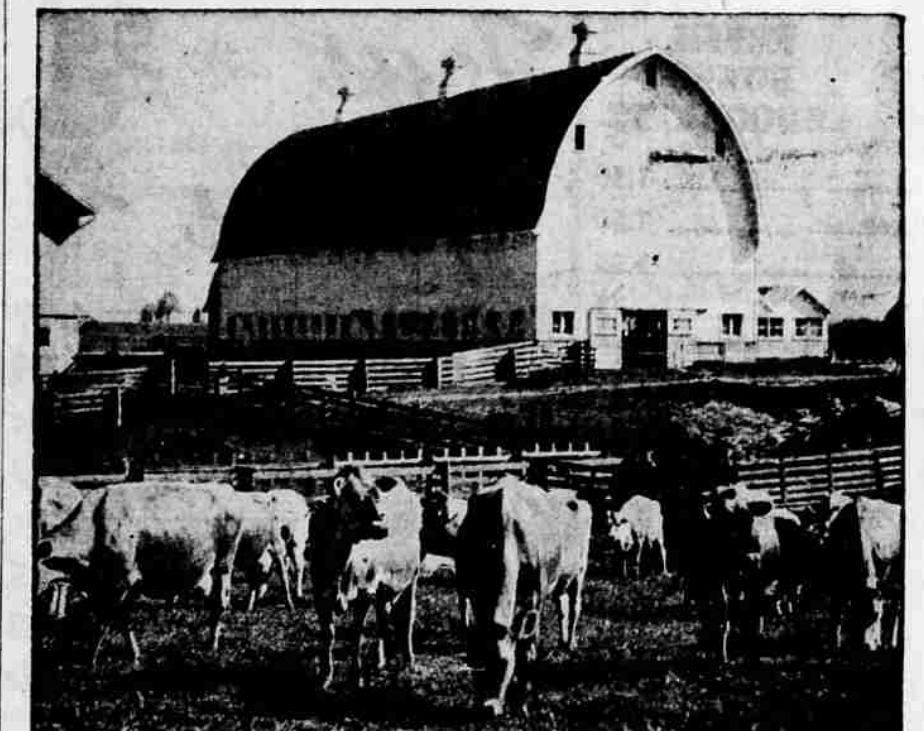
The tree struck the roof directly above a bedroom where Mr. and Mrs. Adkinson were sleeping.
