

Lake Lodgings Open Saturday

An unseasonal warm rain pelted the mountain section to the north Friday morning and a light drizzle dampened the Klamath country today as highways were washed clean of any snow left from the storm 10 days ago.

A combination of rain and snow fell at Crater Lake national park and the four-inch fall which sent the depth to 54 inches, was wet and heavy. Ski conditions were far from good, park officials said. Roads are open and in good condition and a good crowd is expected this weekend to take advantage of the first winter accommodations since Pearl Harbor.

Starting Saturday, meals will be served at Crater Lake national park headquarters and the public is invited to participate. Those wishing to stay overnight are advised that sleeping facilities are available and bedding will be provided if so desired. The new ski tow will not be in operation this weekend but it is hoped that the tow will be ready for the following week. T. C. Parker, assistant park superintendent, left for the park Friday morning to discuss opening of the park facilities with Richard Price, head of the Crater Lake Lodge company, and Charles Fyock, company, who are preparing accommodations.

Stock Market Stays Level

NEW YORK, Dec. 13 (AP)—Light demand bolstered the stock market in today's stock market while many leaders were neglected at moderately active levels.

The list slipped after a slightly irate market opened on Monday and then reverted to indecision. Gains of fractions to a point or more were seen in a number of issues but numerous losses persisted. The ticker tape frequently loaded and transferred the full proceedings to a round 1,000,000 shares.

Grain Price Remains High

CHICAGO, Dec. 13 (AP)—Profit-taking following the recent advance entered grain prices today. All cereals retreated. Wheat advanced 1/4 cent to 1.24 1/2, but showed resistance to the downturn. Losses of more than a cent were recorded by the market in wheat.

Selling was touched off by announcement of the local commodity credit corporation's plan to buy 100,000 bushels of wheat for export in six weeks. The government office also bought 100,000 bushels of wheat for export in six weeks. Cash prices did not follow the slump in the full week. The hard wheat sold at \$2.22 a bushel, highest price for this grade in 26 years although red wheat was 1/4 cent lower.

December oats advanced 1/4 cent to 34 1/2 cents.

Vet Laws May Be Changed

SALEM, Dec. 13 (AP)—Changes in existing state laws affecting veterans will be proposed at the 1947 legislative session, the advisory committee of the department of veterans affairs announced Thursday.

Committee Chairman John Walter Jones, Portland, said he would discuss the proposed amendments with Governor Snell before disclosing the changes planned.

Veterans' organizations had previously urged increasing the maximum amount of money under the state veterans' home and farm loan act and speeding the checking of such applications.

Work Continues On Parking Meters

Street department men are taking advantage of good weather to prepare downtown streets for parking meters. A new project is the construction of narrow cement walkways from curbs to sidewalks where meters are to be set up on ground not covered by concrete.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas suggested the idea as a service to the driving public as well as a means of securing meter posts more firmly in the ground. Crews are still at work installing the steel posts.

No word has been received concerning the placement of the meters, but city officials expect them to arrive within the next few days.

State police, investigating the crash, said Pigg and Edward Willis Ayer, 414 Belmont, entered court, were on a motorcycle which collided with a machine operated by Charles Warner Robertson, 1541 Derby. Robertson was uninjured and Ayer had minor cuts to the hands and was treated at the hospital and released. Officers said they did not know which of the two young men was operating the motorcycle. Pigg's condition is said to be good despite severe facial injuries and shock.

Indians Urged To Operate Own Mill

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 13 (AP)—Indians of the west will be encouraged to operate their own sawmills, Indian service officials from five states decided at a meeting here yesterday.

E. Morgan Fryer, zone director, said Indians own an estimated 6,000,000 acres of the "very best" timber in Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and Nevada. He added that in the eastern states many tribes own and operate their own mills.
