Foreign Mail Speeded Up

Mail destined for foreign countries and mail which passes through New York is now free to travel without being held up at the post office, according to Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins. Such mail has previously been stored at the local office due to a tremendous pile-up of parcels bound for overseas at the New York terminals. This morning, Hawkins said, all stored mail at the local office was dispatched and on its way.

Mailing has slackened up the last two days, according to Hawkins, with the volume of outgoing mail falling below the average for the earlier parts of the week. The post office expects a flood of mail, however, Saturday and Monday, with the volume steadily increasing in tempo until the day before Christmas.


