

# Memorial To Be Built By Lake Legion

LAKEVIEW, December 14—With four lots given to the Veterans of World War I and II by Lake county, the Lake County Post No. 53 of the American Legion is going ahead with the excavating and preparation to build a living memorial to the men and women who served in World War I and II. The Legion feels that at the present time the need for the veterans memorial building on which they are planning, is more urgent than ever.

The structure is to be a two-story, concrete fire-proof building consisting of a basement, which will be used as a meeting place for veterans and veteran organizations, and an upper floor which will be used as an auditorium. The basement will include a large meeting room with lockers, a clubroom and kitchen with a stairway leading to the auditorium which can be used for serving large banquets. Located in the basement will also be the heating plant and lavatories. An entrance room will be located in the center of the west side.

The auditorium, which will have 6000 feet of floor space, will be adequate to hold conventions of state calibre, and may also be used by any civic, county or other organizations needing a large space to hold meetings of various kinds. The north end of the auditorium will be equipped with a stage and dressing rooms, and the south end with a ladies lounge and rest room. It is planned to install a basketball and handball court for the use of the younger groups who might wish to indulge in those sports.

To make this room more fitting as a living memorial to those men and women from Lake county who served in the armed forces during both World wars, it will be adorned with a tablet or plaque bearing the names of all those who served, and another with names of those who lost their lives while in the service of their country.

It is planned to install three double doors on the east side of the building in order that large crowds may be discharged quickly. These doors will open on to a landscaped terrace facing the hill. Leading to the street level will be wide, easy stairs in order to avoid any congestion.

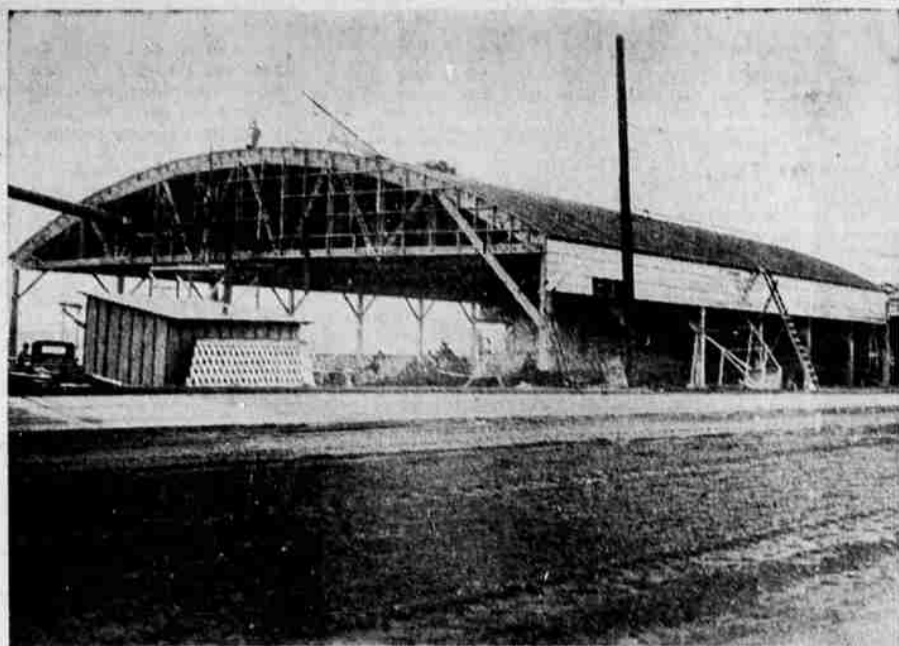
## Rev. Phillips Addresses Rotary

## Navy Enlistees Get GI Benefits

Men who enlist in the navy before the termination of the present war will still benefit by the GI bill of rights, announces the local navy recruiting office.

Any man enlisting under this category is eligible, providing he serves a minimum of 90 days and is honorably discharged. The 90-day period need not be completed before the termination of the present war.

The amount of education to which the man is entitled after discharge is one year plus the time served before the termination of the present war. However, if the termination extends for three years or more, the man will be entitled to the full four years of education provided by law.

## Judge Fines Passenger

SEATTLE, Dec. 14 (AP)—An order by Superior Judge James T. Lawler that a passenger in a hit-run automobile involved in a traffic death must pay \$1000 toward the support of nine children left motherless by the accident, or go to prison, was said by attorneys today to have set a precedent in Washington law.

Lawler deferred sentencing of Richard C. Book, 24, for three years on condition he pay \$30 a month to the nine children of Lawrence Garrity, whose wife was killed last April 27. Garrity and a neighbor, Mrs. Lois Anders, were seriously injured when they and Mrs. Garrity were struck on the Pacific highway south of here by a car driven by John W. Fitzwater, 24, naval chief commissary steward.

When Deputy Prosecutor Duane T. Shinn told the court Book had mixed beer and whiskey drinks while Fitzwater drove at 60 to 70 miles an hour, the judge retorted: "Fitzwater was like a man with a machine gun. Book 'passed the ammunition.' He aided and abetted."

## Lake O' The Woods Road Said Open

Summer home owners at Lake O' the Woods were advised by Caretaker Ed Morse in a call to The Herald and News Saturday morning from Rocky Point, that the road is open to the resort and around the east side of the lake to the spring hydrant.

Morse said that recent rains had melted much of the snow but the west side road remains closed. There is no ice on the lake and no more trees have fallen in the area. Those driving to the lake this week-end should carry chains, Morse advised. The melting snows have caused the lake to raise about one foot, the caretaker reported.

## Forest Areas Set Aside

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—A program described by Oscar L. Chapman, undersecretary of the interior, as destined to create the "largest experimental laboratory for sustained yield forest management in the world" has been started by the interior department in a 478,707-acre area of western Oregon's Lane and Douglas counties.

The area has been designated as the Siuslaw master unit, first of 12 involving 2,500,000 acres of federal land in 18 Oregon counties estimated to have a yearly production capacity of 606,664,000 board feet of timber.

Chapman issued his order yesterday creating the Siuslaw unit, and also specified that a region including Eugene, Springfield, Cottage Grove, Junction City, Sheshire and other communities shall be a marketing area given
