

Judge Upholds Right Of Rogue River Motel Builder

PORTLAND, Dec. 14 (AP)—The "moral" right of a Rogue River man to finish constructing a motel in defiance of civilian production administration regulations was upheld in federal court here.

Judge Claude McColloch, in a memorandum opinion which referred to "the absurdities of the law," refused yesterday to grant an injunction preventing Will H. Jones from completing his auto court. The CPA asked for an injunction, contending Jones started building the central section of his motel after the March 26 "freeze" date. Two other units had already been built.

"Here is an old man who has done nothing worse than spend \$17,000 of his and his wife's life savings in buying a piece of southern Oregon real estate, and constructing an eight-unit auto court," said the judge. "Since when in this country did it become morally wrong for an energetic old person . . . to go about making his living by improving and renting property?"

"Technically, this sturdy citizen may have violated the regulations. He did not do so knowingly. He saw, all about him, office buildings, newspaper edifices, banks and other commercial structures rising. What was there to make him think he was violating the law by building a simple unit, which would house eight families, although not of the particular kind permitted by the regulations? He has all the materials on the ground to finish the project, fully paid for.

"He and his wife, who expect to reside in one of the units, are living in a trailer house, despite the inclement weather. I cannot in conscience restrain these people from finishing the unit. . . If, by doing this, defendant becomes subject to other penalties, that, I would say, under the conditions presently existing in Grants Pass, would be one of the absurdities of the law."
